MINUTES

The 6th meeting of the 31st Legislative Session was called to order at 6:15pm.

The roll was taken with the following senators absent : Joseph Benzing, Benson Orenca, Saeed Smith, & Brian Wekar.

Before the minutes were approved, bill #13 was moved to Special Order on request by Harmonie Schwartz.

BUDGET APPEALS

The club funding for the organizations had problems with the money aspect. The \$18,000 limit for the total of all the clubs could not go below or above. Each club came up to make a presentation of why they should have the monies given that they requested.

Del Sarte Dance Club : both the president and vice president made their speech. The dance club has a dance each semester where girls perform to choreographed dances in Waterman Theatre. Their performance costs about \$600.00 to put on and they make no profit from their performances. They requested \$1350.00 and they were recommended \$500.00. Included in the \$600 is stage rental, dance floor, programs, plus advertising. Right now they are asking for \$800 to cover the show which takes place on Nov. 30th. They are in desperate need for the money! For everything : \$350-labor, \$150-dance floor, \$80-sound. All performances are free of charge.

Men's Volleyball Club : The funding for this club is quite high:\$575-league fees instead of \$800; \$75-team fees; 15 games at \$650. Their total request was \$2,325. In order to play for this falls tournament(USUBA), they need to have the funding. The uniforms are bought at the expense of the team members. The amonut recommended was nothing.

Basic : Amount requested is \$1600 and the recommendation was \$200. This request would benefit towards retreats and guest speakers. Chris Strong motioned for it but Roy Miranda objected and stated that the club is not here to justify themselves. Taryn Breen motioned to fund as recommended at \$200.

Del Sarte : Roy suggested a recommendation of \$500 with an additional \$600, totaling to \$1100 and then to fundraise the extra \$200. 5 opposed and 15 in favor. The club received \$600.

Chemistry Club : Amount requested is \$1000 and recommended at \$250. They would like to appeal for at least an additional \$150 to cover speakers. Brendan Hanlen and Roy spoke upon this matter and Harmonie motioned to add \$100 to \$200 for a total of \$350. There was a 12 to 7 favor. The fund was approved.

History Club : Their total request was \$500 and recommended at \$100. This will cover the Boston and Ottawa trips (gas money and hotel money), food and advertising for film night. Harmonie suggested to give \$100 to the club. It was 4:16-fails. She also stated that they could fundraise on their own. Mike Allain said to give \$170 total to the \$100. Taryn added to give an additional \$70 making it \$170. A 11:9-fails. Chris motioned to fund \$220; 11:9-passes with \$220 total.

Japanese Club : Requested \$200 and was recommended \$100. The president, Jara Thomas, wrote a letter to the senate stating to consider their appeal. They need a minimum of \$200 to do their yearly Japanese Culture Night. Mark Nuzkowski motioned to fund the \$200; an 18:2 passed the funding for the club.

Latin Dance Troupe : Requested \$1200 and was recommended \$400. Their appeal is asking for costumes, road trips, and videos. Camille Gordon, Diogenes Delos Santos, and Roy spoke upon the matter. A motion was given and it was a 16:4-fails. Brendan motioned to add \$100 (\$500 total); 11:9-fails. A motion to add \$200 for a total of \$600; 15:5-passes. A total of \$600 passed.

Harmonie motioned to have the \$575 for the Men's Volleyball Club passed. A 11:7 passes with 1 substained; a total of \$2975 to cover the official and tournament fees. Charles Barley motioned to make it \$1000; 11:7-fails. Harmonie motioned to fund \$1200; 10:8:1-fails. It was then motioned to \$750; 15:3:1-fails. A final motion was proposed to fund \$1555; 15:3:1-passes.

EXECUTIVE REPORTS

Chirs Friskey, the president of the SA, stated that the audit will be presented to the senate on the October 11 meeting. Chris brought the nominees for the SA court to be voted on(John, Kevin, Jim). Kevin and Jim were approved by the senate but John was opposed by Roy. The senate was moved to executive session from 7:45-8:00pm. The Supreme Court Cheif Justice John was approved-14:6 favor.

The Parlimentary Procedure Training session, by Chris Brodt, is postpone til the next meeting on the 11th of October.

An NYPIRG member spoke of how 500 students to vote on the campus. Certain projects include small claims court.

An election for the pro temp was given where Charlie Wing won over Gary McDermont.

FINANCIAL REPORT

According to the accounts, they are the same: \$4500, \$13,000 and \$7500.

NEW BUSSINESS

Bill #13 - Harmonie motioned to amend the following : Chemistry Club, \$250 to 350; Del Sarte, \$500 to 1100; Hlstory Club, \$100 to 220; Japanese Club, \$100 to 200; El Ritmo Dance Club, \$400 to 600 & Men's Volleyball, \$900 to 2130. The total Club Program Fund would be \$13,610. A vote on the amendment was 15:5-favor. Taryn stated that the \$13,610 figure needs to change to \$14,210. A vote on that was 19:1-passes. Bill #13 was passed with a 20 to 0 approval. This bill is submitted by The Financial Department.

OLD BUSSINESS

Bill #9 - Funds for the Asian Student Association. This group is submitted by Ly Lee, ASA president and sponsered by Camille Gordon and Charles Barley. Their amonut requested is \$1500 which will cut their 6th annual dinner. A vote was taken with a 12:7 favor. Charles Barley motioned to strike the movie marathn, the feast and to change the \$1500 figure to a lesser amount. 6 favored and 13 opposed. Diogenes suggested to change \$1500 to \$1416.75. A vote was 10:9-fails. Another vote was taken to have

the final funds be at \$1416.75 for the ASA and it was passed to a 10:9 vote.

Bill #11 - Appointment of Off-Campus Senators. This bill is submitted by Michael Hall, Director of OCA, and Chris Brodt, SA Vice President. It is sponsored by Thomas Campany, Roy Mirenda. This bill entitles at least five off-campus senators to be appointed. A general consent of the senate approved this bill.

NEW BUSINESS

Bill #10 - Attendance Policy. This bill is submitted by Todd Bullock, Executive Asst. to the Vice President; The Prodedure Committee, and Chris Brodt, SA Vice President. It is sponsored by Harmonie Schwartz, Kristi Digioia and Mark Nuzzkowski. This bill states that if any time a senator misses two committee meetings and/or two Senate meetings without a proxy and/or any combination of the above, will receive a written "Notification of Continuous Absence" from the President of the Senate.

Bill #14 - Phone Account for the Black Student Union. Submitted by Ainsley Burrows, BSU President and sponsored by Harmonie Schwartz and Camielle Gordon.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:40pm.



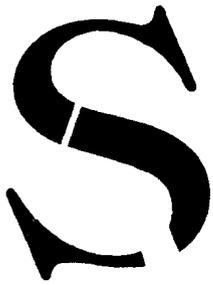

MINUTES

The 7th meeting of the 31st Legislative Session was called to order at 6:10pm.

The role was taken with the following senators absent : Steven Woods, Susan Tornatore, Chris Strong, Joseph Benzing, Saeed Smith, & Dennis Shrader. Susan Borrow (off-campus senator) is no longer with us and Kristin Pizzarello representing Seneca Hall is now a member of the Senate.

Both the Agenda and Minutes were approved.

Note : this is the first senate meeting aired on the campus TV station, WTOP.

EXECUTIVE REPORTS

Chris Friskey confronted the Senate to discuss the problem with Bill #9 - the Asian Student Association. This bill was brought back to the Senate about the veto address and reconsideration. It was advised to think what is being done to the ASA and hopefully would not convey a dangerous message by the Senate. ASA will plan out a new money expense outline and come back to the Senate with the outline and for redonsideration and this bill. This requires a 2/3rd's vot to override the veto (12 total). No Senator favored to keep the bill as is; 18 oppossed to have it brought back and Kristin Pizzerello substained because she is a new member.

Friskey brought Bill #10 - Attendance Policy - where he stated that it is very confusing to understand and should be rewritten differently for the constitution as a bi-law.

GUEST SPEAKERS

A guest speaker Jason Miller from SAVAC came to the Senate and discuss how they need a new stretcher. Their present one is unsafe and hazardous. Chris Wing asked if the lialbility will be covered in the insurance; enough would be covered Miller stated

and also Roy Miranda asked how much money would be needed to buy the stretcher; right now it is uncertain.

Guest speaker Rachael Tronzano, from NYPIRG, spoke to the Senate in regards of the budget cut and the testimony that passed facts with the tuition of SUNY Oswego. Tronzano spoke with Governor George Pataki on tuesday about the present issues. Rachael wished that more people from the college would have attended but the conversation went well. Also Michael Kline from NYPIRG spoke on behalf of the voter registration blitz day that runs til friday the 13th. This is a campus-wide event where they try to register as many people as possible. Kline asked if there would be any Senators willing to help with the blitz day.

Chris Brodt introduced the President from the Black Student Union, Ainsley Burrows. Ainsely would like the Senate to reconsider Bill #14 that was turned down at the last meeting. They are asking for a phone which they have been without for four years. The phone benefits the BSU in order to communicate with other organizations. Right now the money is coming out of Burrow's pocket for the phone bill. BSU is asking for \$500 from the Senate to grant.

Brodt made a change on Bill #10 - page #1-the paragraph beginning with "Therefore Be Enacted . . ." to replace the word 'adapted' to 'adopted'; page #2-"BE IT EVEN FURTHER ENACTED . . ." paragraph, have 'Supreme Court' changed to 'Senate'.

Parliamentary Procedure Training - Brodt pointed out the usage of proper terminology. "Point of information" is used when asking a question where you may interupt the speaker and is used with no debate in hand and also clearing an uncertain statement; this is not used on a bill. "Point of order" implies a protest breach of rules or conduct.

FINANCE REPORT

Chris Conover, director of finance, presented to the Senate a booklet from Coopers & Lybrand on the current financial stats of the college. The audit will be given at the next meeting (October 18th). The account balances are the same : #914 - \$4,000; #915 - \$13,000; #916 - \$7,500.

OLD BUSINESS

Chris Brodt led the discussion on the former bills : Bill #10-Attendance Policy - Harmonie Schwartz, Kristi Digioia, & Mark Nuskowski are the sponsers of this bill. Harmonie stated that the amendments should be recommended and for the bill to be passed. Digioia agreed with Harmonie's statement and Mark withdrew from his sponsorship. Speaker Roy Miranda suggested to work with the bill correctly to prevent any shortcomings. Taryn Breen made a motion to have the procedure committee return the bill by October 25th. A general consent was favored.

Bill #14-BSU Phone Account - Harmonie Schwartz and Camielle Gordon are the

sponsors. Harmonie stated to give the account to the BSU. Camielle added by saying that they are fundraising to have a phone; it is a good bill and the \$500 should be given. Roy Miranda doesn't want to bring the bill back up due to the \$500 issue. There are other funds elsewhere to come from and he does not endorse this. Taryn Breen agreed with Roy and added that they are asking for a lot of money for a phone. Brendon Halen was impressed with President Burrows speech but it is not the Senates problem. Burrows addressed the Senate saying that no Senator came down to the BSU office and asked where the money is going to. Thomas Campany will vote for the \$500 ammount; the BSU deserves the money. Miranda spoke a second time and clearly stated, he doesn't want to give the money to BSU. A vote for Bill #14 was taken - 11:9-passes.

NEW BUSINESS

Bill #15 - Transfer for SAVAC Stretcher

Submitted by Kristi Digioia, Cayuga Hall Senator and sponsored by Mark Nuzzkowski, Brendon Halen, Charles Barley and Mike Allain. This bill is enacted by the SA that \$1,000 be transferred from SAVAC account #871 (Insurance Fund) to account #873 (Medical Supplies) to cover the cost of the stretcher and still have enough money in each account for further purchases.

Bill #16 - BACCHUS Conference

Submitted by Kristin Clogg, LifeStyles Center Graduate Assistant, Programs and Awareness Campaigns & Kimberly Bowman, Coordinator LifeStyles, Alcohol & Other Drugs Education. Sponsored by Harmonie Schwartz, Roy Miranda, Taryn Breen, Kristi Digioia, & Diogenes Delos Santos. It is enacted that the SA give the sum of \$400 transferred from account #915 to #723-1 for the purpose of paying the registration fees for the Washington D.C. conference.

PUBLIC ANNOUNCEMENTS

Roy Miranda commented of the disrespectfull behavior in the background with the BSU. Roy felt they didn't deserve it and that you have to vote on the interest of your hall but go with your mind.

Michael Hall meet with the off-campus senators breifly after the meeting.

Chris Brodt was very pleased in how the meeting was run.

Mark Nuzzkowski announced that ther will be an EMT course offered next semester; there is a meeting on Thursday October 12th, 7pm in room 217 of Hewitt Union.

The Parents, Family, Friends weekend will be held October 20-22. Many are attending this year with about 150 families staying on campus.

Marcus and Kristin from LifeStyles are pleased on how the After Hours program is going strong this year. He noted that there is not as many house parties because of the

After Hours. The week of the 16th of October begins the NCCAW week where many campus-wide events will take place such as "Lets Make A Deal" game show, mocktail contest, cyberdance and much more.

Rachael from NYPIRG reminded that friday is the last day to register to vote.

Chris Friskey mentioned that holding a senate position is a tough job.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:20pm.

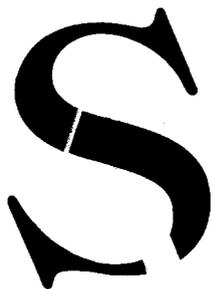

MINUTES

The 8th meeting of the 31st Legislative Session was called to order at 6:34pm.

The roll was taken with the following senators absent : Brendan Hanlon, Joseph Benzing, Benson Orenca, & Michael Pauldine a new off-campus senator; also Elizabeth Linderberry(off-campus senator), John Rowe(Hart Hall senator) are new members of the Senate.

Before the approval of the agenda, HarmonieSchwartz made an objection to the NYPIRG Resolution #1. Brodt stated that the resolution is a state of opinion, not a bill. Harmonie motioned to the resolution to a vote : yes-resolution#1taken off the agenda or no-resolution stay on the agenda;it was in favor to keep the resolution on the agenda(18:6).

Both the Agenda and Minutes were approved.

Note: the Senate Meetings will now begin at 6:30pm instead of 6:00pm.

EXECUTIVE REPORTS

Chris Friskey introduced two members of Coopers & Lybrand to present the 1995 audit. The audit went more efficient this year and was given ample assistance. The Balance Sheets (assets, liabilities and fund balance) were read off with the prepaid expenses being new this year and the note payable is paid off. A booklet was passed out to the senators stating all the report on audited financial statements where the year ended June 30,1995.

Friskey brought up Bill#16 - BACCHUS Conference where 4 students would be sent to a General Assembly in Washington, D.C. for student leaders on November 2-5,1995. The purpose of the Conference is to offer a presentation on alcohol issues and to gain more knowledge about health and wellness prevention programs that are successful at other campuses. This is a deserving bill to get passed and is one of the best divisions on campus that benefits students. The leaders would come back and educate the students on campus. For the NCAAW week, more than 800 people

pledged, stated Kristin Clogg, LifeStyles Center Graduate Assistant. The "Top Ten Ways. . ." posters will be nationally reproduced and become an SA event.

Rachel Tronzano and Micheal Kline from NYPIRG came to speak about the voter registration that occurred last Saturday where 700 people registered on blitz day. On November 2-4 there is a NYPIRG convention with workshops in Binghamton. Call x4495 to sign up for the convention; there will be a fee.

Friskey commented on Resolution#1 saying that it is the students choice to give their \$3 / semester to NYPIRG not the Senates. This resolution should not be discussed.

In Bill#16, it was declared that the SA should receive some credit for the BACCHUS Convention.

In Resolution#1 *people need to understand it is an opinion of this body* Listening to both sides of the issue will help. Brodt asked how everyone feels about the issue; it's an open debate-democracy. He won't speak on issue anymore-has strong feelings toward this.

FINANCE REPORT

Same as last week : #914 - \$4,000; #915 - \$13,000; #916 - \$7,500.

OLD BUSINESS

Bill#15 - SAVAC Stretcher - Charles Barley commented on how they contribute greatly to the campus; if they don't get a new stretcher they can be liable if the current one is damaged; Barley says to approve it. Mike Allain stated that it is a good bill and should be passed. A 22:0:2 passes the bill; Mark Nuzzkowski and Taryn Breen abstain because they are SAVAC members.

Bill#16 - BACCHUS Conference - Harmonie Schwartz withdrew from her sponsorship. Sponsors Roy Miranda, Taryn Breen, Kristi Digioia & Diogenes Delos Santos all agree to have the bill pass and it is a real asset to the campus. Speaker Chris Strong stated that it is a positive aspect for Oswego. Thomas Campany wanted to amend the sum of \$400 to \$592. Roy Miranda asked if LifeStyles can contribute to the funding of the trip. Kimberly Bowman, Coordinator of the Center, stated that they are contributing to the hotel & travel expenses. A motion was placed for the change in sum value : 8:15:1-fails. It was stated that the following sentence be added to the "Therefore Be It Enacted" : ", . . . and the Student Association be induced as sponsors of this event." Schwartz motioned to amend; 22:1:1-passes.

NEW BUSINESS

Resolution#1-Charles Wing was the speaker(President Pro Temp); speaker Harmonie Schwartz stated that NYPIRG is the only environmental group on campus and that they are asking for support.

Barley said the Senate's opinion is valuable and a blatant attack on NYPIRG is not proper; the resolution's wording is poor.

Roy Miranda classifies it as an opinion and that the \$40,000 should be generated to

another organization. Roy stated that last years rallies with the NYPIRG interferred classes and was disrupted. This comment by Roy was voted on to weather it was right to say or not. 16 Senators said yes and 5 said no. Roy then continued to speak about the rallies.

Taryn Breen stated that the resolution is harsh in terms.

Rachel Tronzano came to speak again to the Seante : how can you vote for funding when things haven't begun; it is early in the year. Rachel said that it was believed that last years rally was sponsered by SA and ALANA.

Chris Brodt is bothered by the resolution since last year and that NYPIRG has control over the money not the students.

Augustin Busschaert stated that it should not be an attack; he is not against NYPIRG.

Gary McDermott doesn't agree with the termonology of the resolution and that it should come back in different wording.

2nd speakers - Charles Barley stated that everyone has the right to go down to the NYPIRG office; if it is not passed it will be a bad impression to the students.

Roy Mirenda stated that the organization was not known (impression-wise) last year; this is just an opinion.

Taryn Breen moved to end the debate. 14:6-passes.

A final vote on resolution#1 : 4:15:1-fails.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Barley was disgusted with resolution#1. Michael Allain would have like to personally research information on NYPIRG. Chirs Strong stated that senators should not attack other Senators. The Parents and Family weekend will take place this weekend with many events for everyone. Dennis Schrader noted that on Friday October 27 the Laker Hockey team opens its season. Roy reminded that the procedure meeting next week is at 6pm. Strong added that on Saturday night the Solid State and St ate Singers will perform in the ballroom in Hewitt at 10pm. They are a great asset to this campus.

The meeting was adjorned at 8:55pm.

Executive Session began at 6:50pm.

All was recaped and there was an approval of the Agenda and Minutues.

EXECUTIVE REPORT

Chris Friskey introduced Bill#17 - Impeachment Laws (to later dicussed in New Business). Harmonie Schwartz spoke on behalf of NYPIRG regarding postcards and a raffle. Mike West, regional coordinator of NYPIRG spoke about duites of the organization. The 10th meeting of the 31st Legislative Session was called to order at 6:39pm.

The roll was taken with the following senators absent : Charles Barley, Joseph Benzing, Benson Orenca, Saeed Smith, Brian Wekar, Elizabeth Linderberry, & Jeannien Wagner.

The Approval of the Agenda was objected for Resolution #2 to be moved under New Business. It was approved.

There was an Approval of the Minutes.

EXECUTIVE REPORT

Chris Friskey introduced the manager of WNYO radio station. He invited all the senators to attend a tour of the campus media circuit - the radio station, TV station, and the newspaper. The tour is next Wednesday at 5:30pm.

Senator Schwartz, on behalf of NYPIRG, announced on Tuesday the 7th of November there is election day. On-campus students can vote in Hewitt Union and off-campus students can vote in Snygg Hall.

Jeremy Jones, Assistant Director of Communications, spoke about Resolution #2 - stated that sophomores have to stay on-campus for the 1996-97 year.

Bill #17 was passed-Impeachment Laws.

Chris Brodt brought up Bill #18 - Funding for the Ontarian Yearbook. Brodt said that the staff should come up with money before coming to the Senate.

Brodt reminded that all of the Senators have mailboxes and should check at least once a week.

Chris said that Resolution #2 should be taken back to the hall councils and discuss the situation. Chris then read a letter from Chuck Weeks, Director of Housing & Residential Life, declaring what the procedure is about housing next year.

Receiving the postcards will inspire families to buy the yearbook. Speaker Mark Nuzzkowski agrees with Senator Mirenda. It should be passed now or spend the \$500 they have. Senator Strong said they spent \$9.39 for the month of October and they should have ample money to cover expenses. Senator Kramer said it shouldn't matter how much they spent as long as they have enough money. A vote was taken - 15:9-passes.

NEW BUSINESS

Bill #19 - Attendance Policy - submitted by Todd Bullock, Executive Asst. to the Vice President, The Procedure Committee, and Chris Brodt, SA Vice President. Sponsored by Kristi DiGioia & Mike Allain. This bill is to ensure that the attendance is kept in order. There are four sections dedicated to the bill. It says, if any senator misses two consecutive meeting or without a proxy he/she will receive a written "Notification of Continuous Absence" from the President of the Senate. Also a list of the senators who are absent are to listed under the minutes.

Resolution #2 - A Message To Residence Life - submitted by Jerremy Jones and sponsored by Roy Mirenda, Mike Allain, & Diogenes Delos Santos. The resolution states that the policy would insist that sophomores remain on campus. About 75% of freshman stay on-campus for their sophomore year. Residence Life needs to develop a more strategic and comprehensive plan to address shortage of residence students.

Sponsors Roy, Diogenes, and Mike all agreed that you don't want the price to go up but you shouldn't tell students where to live, it is their choice. Other strategic procedures should be taken into hand.

Speaker Schwartz stated that students should not be forced to stay on-campus; it is cheaper to live off-campus.

Jeremy Jones said that housing goes up every semester and it's a lot cheaper to live off-campus. The Senate should feel angry because the housing department didn't ask the students how they feel about it. The Senate represents the students and alternatives should be found.

Friskey would like to see alternative ideas to get students to stay on-campus. What can Residence Life and Housing do for the students? Hart Hall will be closed next year for renovation and Johnson Hall will reopen (co ed).

It was stated that 20 years ago everyone wanted to stay on-campus. There used to be 750 students living in Seneca Hall. In the mid-'80's students started to leave campus, mostly juniors and seniors. Now more commuters come from local towns. It was encouraged to come to the Residence Life on the 3rd floor of Culkin Hall to ask questions.

Bobby Sinclair commented that students would save a lot of money living off-campus; prices will go up.

Senator Strong suggested for Residence Life that people from further cities commute to Oswego everyday so it is hard for people to live on-campus.

Senator Company said that students should choose to live on or off campus.

Camille Gordon agreed with Company that student should make their own decisions.

Mirenda suggested an incentive be proposed to stay on-campus. The students need to make their own decision, mistakes, and experiences. make it worth our while and listen to the voices of the students.

Kramer stated that it is obscured to tell students where to stay. He is against keeping the idea of students on-campus.

Diogenes said there should be a motive for students to stay on-campus.

Wing calculated the amount to stay on-campus for 8 months being \$5,240 and 12 months off-campus it is cheaper.

Second Speakers :

Schwartz motioned to amend the resolution by adding the following, "Be it further resolved that Residence life and Housing plans to change housing policy which directly affect students that we request they consult with the voice of the campus," SA Senate.

A general consent passed the resolution along with the addition of the above statement.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Harmonie Schwartz reminded to fill out the NYPIRG postcards.

Roy Mirenda is endorsing the attendance policy to go to the hall councils; he thank the committee for the Impeachment Law; and encouraged to attend the College Community Day.

Jerremy Jones was pleased to see that the Senate can discuss the resident policy rational.

Chris Strong commended the Crew Club on a good job for their competition.

Dennis Schrader announced that the Laker Hockey team has a tournament this weekend (3-4th) @ R.I.T.

Chris Brodt reminded senators to look for an invitation in their mailboxes about the College Community Day.

Bobby Sinclair announced that there is a procedure meeting at 6pm next week.

Rachel Tronzano from NYPIRG urged senators to fill out the postcards.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:47pm.

MINUTES

The 11th Meeting of the 31st Legislative Session was called to order at 6:45pm.

The roll was taken with the following senators absent : Steve Babson, Gary McDermott, Tara Jacobs, Christine Behringer, Joseph Benzing, Ted Kramer, Benson Orenca, Saeed Smith, & Jeannien Wagner.

There was an Approval of the Minutes and the Agenda.

EXECUTIVE REPORT

Chris Brodt introduced the Miss-a-Meal program. It is where students can sign up to not eat dinner on December 7th. It is sponsored by the Auxiliary Service; proceeds go to projects around the town and various organizations. The following clubs have certain projects that the program is funding toward :

Phi Beta Sigma - a proposal of buying a Scotter (a modernize wheelchair) that would cost \$650 plus parts. The Scotter would go to the physically challenged to assist them to go to classes. The present transportation is a bit bearable and the machine would get more usage around campus and to further their education. One Scotter is appreciated but two would be good. The one that would be bought would function as a trial wheelchair.

Sigma Chi - Roy Mirenda presented their function. The program would raise funds for the Children's Miracle Network, a non-profit organization. It is now a television fund-raiser that generates funds towards the children and hospitals. the funds would go to designated health centers in Syracuse. The money would go to afflicted kids, their needs and charity organizations.

People Against Poverty - It is involved through the Paul Newman Center on campus. They battle the poverty conditions that linger around town. Local food pantries and clothing drives is what the organization contributes to.

PPB Concerts - Chairperson Zilema commented about Bill #20 and how income

affects the possible future of concerts on the campus. Right now the income line is approx. \$10,000 whereas last year it was \$7500. Some concerts are being closed out of acts (professional) because of the income line. The PPB is working to get acts but can't because of the income situation. They have one concert lined up for the spring, Cyprus Hill, but if the income increases PPB won't be able to have them perform.

Friskey said he attended the Student Leadership Assembly; it was very brief. Friskey will deliver the SUNY plan & have all together; it is very complex. Friskey introduced two sets of speakers :

Kristin Clogg - 5 students were sended to the conference in D.C. It was a huge success; they were awarded 5 out 6 awards. Kristin thanked the Senate for sending the students. Congratulations to the LifeStyles Center!

The managers of the media center (WNYO, WTOP, Oswegonian) came to talk on how only 3 senator attended the tour offered earlier that day. General Manager of TOP was very disgusted that many people didn't show up. People could get a better sense of how the equipment works if the senators would of showed up. They took it personally that half of the Senate didn't attend the tour.

Senator Strong didn't like the attack upon the Senate by the media center. It was stated that it was an open attack to every senator not anyone in particular.

~ Brodt was not pleased with the attack by the media center and it was out of order. People are busy and should not yelled at due to busy schedule.

~Brodt reminded about the dinner next Wednesday.

~An election took place to nominate a financial committee - Charlie Wing is the chairperson. The committee would go over charters to submit and to see if the bigger organizations are living up to their charters. The following were elected to serve on the committee : Chris Strong, Steve Woods, Diogenes Delos Santos, & John Rowe.

~ Bill #20 will be discussed next weeks meeting.

FINANCE REPORT

Senator Strong motioned to amend Bill #17, Impeachment Laws, to include constitutional terms. A general consent granted to bring back the bill to be amended. Sponsors Thomas Company & Mike Allain agreed to vote for the amendments. Speaker Strong wanted the following to be amended :

In Section 1, A,2 - the word "claimed" be changed to "claims"

Section 2,A - the statement "or for the conviction of a felony" be deleted.

Section 3, D - #6 " Upon conclusion of the hearings it will take a 2/3 vote of the Senate to find the accused guilty" should be changed to say " . . . 2/3 vote of the Senate members present . . . "

Senator Delos Santos wanted to change the word 'present.' A vote of 17:2 failed his amendment.

There was a vote on Strong's amendment - general consent favored his proposal.

A vote on Bill #17 as a whole was taken; Senator Schwartz motioned to table the bill

until next weeks meeting. It is important to take back to the Hall Council. A 12:7 failed Schwartz's motion.

A final vote was taken fir Bill #17 as a whole and with the new amendments - 18:1-passes.

President Friskey congratulated Strong's changes to the Impeachment Laws.

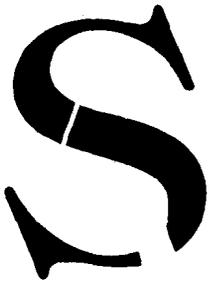

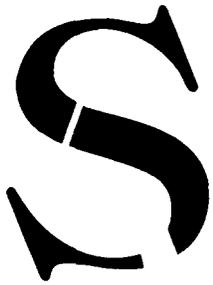

MINUTES

The 16th Meeting of the 31st Legislative Session was called to order at 6:32pm. The roll was taken and the following Senators were absent : Steve Babson, Elizabeth Linderberry, Brian Wekar, and Lyndsey Williams. There was an objection to the Agenda - place Bill 7 to Old Business by Senator Schwartz. There was then an approval of the Agenda.

EXECUTIVE REPORT

Chris Friskey - All was settled with the law suit against SA; a new case is brewing up where the IRS says the SA needs to pay employment to S.A.V.A.C. They will be contacted to see if the SA owes them money.

Problems with the PPB - for the past 2 years the PPB has had the lack of leadership and direction although they are a vital role on campus. Right now they are working on a concert for this semester to play on campus. The Senate finance committee failed their charter in November for the PPB Committee. It is said that the PPB needs some restructure - sending more representation to Artswego. The PPB Cinevisions should have their own separate committee. Clubs and organizations need to be supported and encouraged for speakers to speak at the Senate meetings.

Senator Wagner questioned why change PPB's name? She feels it not necessary to for reconstruction. Nobody breaks down the SA, the SA should help PPB. Chair director Norman Lee commented that the PPB needs an overhaul, changes to be made, and that everything needs to be established.

Senator Mirenda said that PPB should step aside - chair people - and work together and clear things up.

Senator Kramer doesn't understand why reconstructing is necessary; it doesn't need reconstructing but perhaps the internal functions of PPB does.

Norman Lee said that all the quality activities will still be around regardless of any reconstruction. There is an opportunity to grow in the future. The PPB should be a program board and support students; a plan is needed.

Senator Gordon said there should be reconstruction of the leadership in PPB; people

who care and the money is put to use.

It was asked to have 5 Senators on a committee to inform and research of the PPB status.

Senator Breen motioned to form a Senate committee of the PPB (not to be apart of PBB). Nobody on the PPB should be on this committee because they would be biased.

Senator Wagner said it doesn't matter if you're in PPB to be on this committee

Senator Rowe said there should be a committee formed; all are affected by this; combine the Senators with the PPB.

Brodt said the dialog should not be excluded.

Senator Kramer said that you should not exclude the PPB members.

Senator Strong motioned to amend having unbiased members - a vote was taken and 21 said yes and 1 said no - passes.

- Kristin Clogg attended a meeting with Cynthia Donovan about the possibility of having a TicketMaster on campus. There would be no service charge only a bill for the phone line. Can order and use tickets outside of campus - out-of-state - this would provide a service to the students; it would not make money in any way.

- Rachel Tronzano said that consumer issues will be added to NYPIRG; their first general meeting is on Feb. 13th.

Chris Brodt - read the dance club bill - The Ozone - is here for clubs, organizations and the students.

Bill 32 - Crew Club Upgrade to Tier 4 Organization Status - Sponsors Strong, Miranda - Strong said it is a viable club to Oswego State; it is one of the professional clubs on campus. Miranda thanked Strong for the kind words and that the club

provides recreational activity on the campus. A General Consent passed the bill.

Bill 26 - Ozone Dance Club - Senator Schwartz said it will be a great club for Oswego. Senator Wing motioned to amend a section in the bill. General Consent passed the amendment. Wing also said that it is not a bad bill; should pass and move on. 15:2-passes the bill.

Bill 27 - SA Bill 1996-97 -Sponsor Strong said it should get taken care of, has not heard complaints. Senator Breen motioned to amend a section of the bill. Senator McDermott said the bill should be taken back to hall council. A vote on the amendment was 6:11-fails. There was call to question where another amendment took place to raise \$440-550 - 1:16-fails. A final vote on the bill was 17:0-passes.

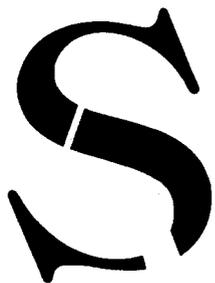

The meeting was called to order at 6:40pm.

The roll was taken and the following Senators were absent : Roy Mirenda, Christine Behringer, Eugenia Charles(Proxy-Ayana Lewis), Ted Kramer, Elizabeth Linderberry, Benson Orenca, Jeannien Wagner(Proxy-Kim Fabian), Lyndsey Williams.

There was an objection to the Agenda - why Bill 35 is not on Old Business - it was then placed to that section. The Finance Report was moved ahead of the Executive Report. There was an approval of the Agenda and the Minutes.

FINANCE REPORT

Lee made a suggestion to put the Ozone Bill to a different account.

EXECUTIVE REPORT

Chris Friskey introduced Thomas Ryan, Assistant Director of Public Safety. Mr. Ryan talked about the use of the new Blue Lights and there is a need for more on campus. The ones right now are 10 to 15 years out of date but are still in working order. The new GTE Blue Lights are less expensive (\$4,000) and are cellular and portable. They run off of solar power. There would be a monthly service charge of \$40 per unit; this is an excellent system for the price and they would be installed by the fall of '96. Ryan said that for the 7 years he has been here, the Blue Lights have been used about 10 times; the campus is very safe. He discussed about perception of safety which is important. The GTE company will always monitor the units daily. This product is cheap compared to others out there on the market. It is designed for true emergencies. There is a new SUNY parking lot at the Chase Bank parking lot; it is also an info. center.

At this time, the Senate went into Executive Session.

Issue with the PPB - Friskey said that he feels that they are not providing proper services to the campus; he urged the Senate to think about the issue concerning the PPB. They cannot go back to what they're doing; not out to get PPB but to help. Right

now there is no operating director; hopes the Senate PPB committee comes with a full report.

Rachel from NYPIRG spoke about Lobby Day in Albany on Feb. 26 - will give more details at the general meeting on the 14th of Feb.-7pm, 212 in the Union(speakers present).

Chris Brodt introduced Charles Barley for the PPB Committee - Barley and committee investigated PPB and found out there are problems but can be fixed; there is miscommunication, misunderstanding within the group. But can move on and forgive past mistakes. Senator Wing questioned about the new constitution.

Two members of PPB came to speak on behalf of their organization - ^{FIONA} Pheona and Paul Santiago - ^{FIONA} Pheona gave thanks for the invitation by the Senate; the PPB needs clarification and would like documentation. They get \$100,000 in allocation which there are reasons for it. There is insufficient leadership by the director and assistant but the chairperson should not be ridiculed. There had been past experiences where there were scheduled meetings on how to use the ledger books and no one showed up. The restructure from PPB's point of view was that they are working hard on a new constitution. Their charters are handed in, inventories completed and an appointment of an SA liaison and a director of finance for PPB. There are hopeful solutions but if the PPB is omitted then there is no campus; there's a need for diversity on campus or it'll be biased. Paul commented on the fact that he hopes the PPB Bill is passed and to move on with rest of the semester.

Senator Barley thought it was wrong to criticize certain people and was offended with ^{FIONA} Pheona's statement where if ALANA leaves, all will be biased. Senator Hanlon wanted an explanation of why the students being directors. There is a need to pull together for the future.

There was a clarification that the PPB doesn't elect directors or assistant directors. The Senate PPB Committee worked and wants it to go ahead whereas the lines of communication have not been good but will remain open; move forward with restructuring.

Brodt announced that on Feb. 8 there is an Election Committee at 6pm.

SPECIAL ORDERS

Bill 38 - PPB Reinstated to Tier 4 - Sponsor Saeed Smith said it is important to work together and he is all for the bill. Sponsor Barley said there was a lack of communication and urges passage of the bill. Senator Breen said they can pull together and have determination and show support for them. Senator Strong said that they should follow Tier 2 regulations sense they didn't follow funding laws; a precedence of danger and is not sure why PPB didn't charter in on time. Senator Gordon said that PPB wants to correct their mistakes and they are trying to pull as one; urges a quick passage. Ayana (proxy) said as a student leader on campus, they will change their ways from the past. Senator McDermott worried about precedence and are here to serve college constituents - passage or fails, what will the constituents feel? Senator Rowe said there is power to supersede. Senator DiGioia yielded to Angelica who said that it cannot be held against us and the PPB can't survive on Tier 2 income. Kim (proxy) said to look at all the events the PPB has put on with the little money they had. It is put to good use where they are capable of doing more for this

semester; said the Senate doesn't know the things PPB does.

There was a vote to end debate on Bill 38 - 5:18-fails.

Mark Nahorny said that programming events for out-of-class activities are important to the campus. Senator Hanlon is for the bill but there are dates for charters to be set; if the bill is passed then get rid of Bill 42. Pres. Friskey said that the Senate has to do something about the problem; it needs restructuring and can be brought to the Senate as a problem and can be fixed. Senator Pauldine yielded to Denise - she said if the bill doesn't pass there will be problems. Senator Wing made an amendment for the "Enacted..." statement - upon proper passage this bill supersede the provisions of Bill 42 of the 31st Legislative Session - a 20:3 passed the amendment. Wing said this amendment will help the bill and PPB will go in the right direction. Senator Company said there is a business to provide to the students and the PPB will get punished for mistakes, but what stands, stands. They do provide service on campus but there is no punishment, no business ethics. Senator Woods mad an amendment, "Be It Even Even Enacted..." - The PPB will give written reports to the Senate of progress. This report will be given every other week starting 2/21. There was a motion to amend the above amendment and change the date 2/21 to 2/19. There was a General Consent to the amended amendment. A call to question was made to the amendment - General Consent. There was also a motion to end the debate, 4:19-fails. A second speakers list led Senator Barley to amend the 1st Be It Enacted clause - place 'new ' in front of constitution and 'drafted by PPB on 2/7/96' after constitution. Wing amended the amendment by striking out the first amendment because the constitution is okay. There was a call to question to strike out the entire statement - 17:5-passes. There was then a motion to move to end debate - 17:5-passes. A final vote on the bill was taken

Senator Woods amended to strike out the last "Enacted" and "Whereas" clauses. A call to question - 12:4-passes. A final call to question to Bill 35 was made - 13:2:1-passes

NEW BUSINESS

Bill 39 - Blue Lights - the Oswego campus needs a more modern and expanded

blue light system where each box will cost a total of \$4,300 each. This is submitted by the Executive Branch and sponsored by Kristen Pizzarello, Charlie Wing, Gary McDermott, Kristi DiGioia, Thomas Company, & Chris Strong.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Senator Strong said he thought he did his research well on the bill and thinks Senators should look at the bill beforehand.

Senator Barley said it was good that the PPB bill was pushed through.

Senator Company said to look for him at the Bobsled competition.

Senator Babson said that there is an orchestra concert on Thursday the 8th.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:10pm.



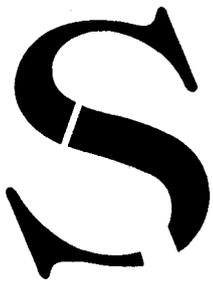

The 18th Meeting of the 31st Legislative Session was called to order at 6:43pm. The roll was taken with the following Senators absent : Kristi DiGioia, Steven Woods, Gary McDermott, Christine Behringer, Thomas Company, Eugenia Charles, Ted Kramer, Elizabeth Linderberry, Saeed Smith, Jeannien Wagner, Lyndsey Williams and a new Senator Brad Goldowsky from Seneca Hall has been appointed a Senator.

There was an approval of the Agenda and the Minutes.

EXECUTIVE REPORT

Chris Friskey announced that there is a search for finding a new president for the college due to the fact Steven Weber is no longer the college president.

WNYO Chairperson, Chris Kelly, spoke on behalf of Bill 40 - Change in Second Year of Three-Year Plan - and said that everything stated on the bill is not all needed. There is better equipment on the market where it'll all cost the same amount of money. Yet the computer for their office is greatly needed. With this computer there can be access to the internet; a modem comes with the computer. The 12 Channel Board is not needed however. The present board will last for more years to come; great to have a new one but the present one won't die out.

A committee is to be formed called the President Search Committee. It will take up a considerable amount of time where the committee would have to stay over spring break. No one volunteered so Bobby Sinclair was nominated and elected to a position he already had.

The memo that students received in the mail from Deborah Stanley about 139 programs cut by SUNY Central, which was printed in the Oswegonian, was misinformed.

Veto on Bill 38 - Friskey cannot sign the PPB reinstatement bill although they need a little help and restructuring. They (PPB) received a memo about reapplying for a charter which they failed to do so. The SA policies were failed by the PPB; ignored the SA laws. The organization has 8 different phone access codes where they have a \$700 phone bill. Friskey said that this is an organization who didn't follow through the

policies and for that cannot sign.

There was then a motion to suspend all rules and to allow debate on the veto of Bill 38.

The count was taken and it was a 9:9 vote-it was upheld. Pres. Friskey said to the Senate that it was their duty to provide services.

Brodts spoke and said that this veto shouldn't have happened at all because it wasn't even on tonight's agenda. He didn't understand where this vote came from - last week was 18:4 and tonight was 9:9! The Senate just put the PPB back to a Tier 2 status where they now have \$2100 to work with. They were getting \$150,000 and now it's not going to function because they cannot survive on a \$2100 income. Since this occurred, all concerts, lectures, movies, etc. are gone.

There was then talk to motion for a quorum and to reconsider the veto. There was a brief 5 minute recess to think about what had just happened. They came back at 7:23. The reconsider was granted and there was a voice roll count. A yes vote would be saying you are for the bill into law and a no vote would agree to veto the bill. The voice roll count :

Senator Delos Santos wanted to amend the bill but could not.

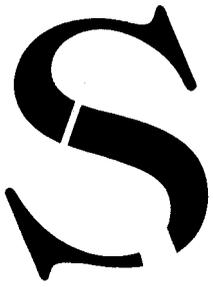

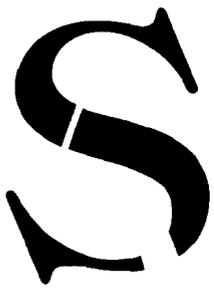

The meeting was then adjourned at 6:40pm.



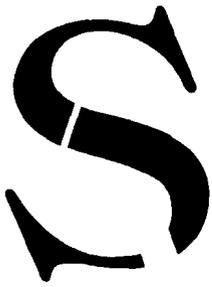

The roll was taken with the following senators absent : Steven Woods, Taryn Breen, Salvatore Graziano, Steve Babson, there was a proxy for Diogenes Delos Santos, Brendan Hanlon, Christine Behringer, Thomas Company, Eugenia Charles, Ted Kramer, Elizabeth Linderberry, Benson Orenca, Saeed Smith, Charlie Wing, and there was a newly appointed off campus senator, Rosanna Troncoso ^{by} and Chris Friskey.

There was an objection to the Agenda to add the week before last week's minutes under tonight's Agenda (listed as 4a). There was an approval. There was an objection to the minutes 2 weeks ago, that under the financial report, it was the 915 account with \$8038.80 which should have been \$838.80. There was an approval.

EXECUTIVE REPORT

Chris Brodt introduced a couple of speakers. Rachel from NYPIRG announced there is an environmental justice forum with speakers from all over the country, to be held on the 2nd floor of the Union. It's an hour long program. Last weekend Harmonie attended a SUNY and CUNY conference. Monday she also attended Lobby Day in Albany which was a good experience.

Kristin Clogg announced that Bill 43 doesn't need sponsors. Supreme Court Justice, John Moretti, talked about the Company vs SA decision. He didn't find any violations with the PPB. There are, however, certain actions that'll have to take place by March 2 which includes setting a GPA average to sit on the PPB Committee. The court cannot declare that Bill 38 is unconstitutional. Sue Thomas, the Cheerleading coach answered any questions about the money figures. Miranda said that the figures are very high.

Pauldine sees it as "life insurance"; perhaps have more and students would use them yet other senators brought up a good point.

Busschaert amended the bill from \$17,200 to \$8,600.

McDermott opposed the amendment ; there should be more than 4 blue lights purchased, just leave bill as is.

Strong yielded to Clogg - you should worry about the new students coming in for their perception of safety.

Strong said that parents look at safety first at colleges; you can't put a price on safety, use it now while it's there.

Rowe said you have to look at the campus environment; Oswego is an open visible area.

Washo said that Thomas Ryan knows of 2 spots where the lights are needed; consider the factors, you can save money on buying 2 lights.

Gordon agrees with the amendment; the whole campus needs lighting in general, the campus is very dark, the money can go towards that.

Strong said that Mr. Ryan should come in once a month to the meeting and give updates.

Busschaert called to question to the amendment.

15:3 passes the amendment.

The original amendment that was passed took another vote and came up 8:10 which failed.

Mirenda called to question on Bill 39 - 11:7 passed Bill 39.

Bill 40 - Change in Second Year of Three-Year Plan - Strong said the radio station has a need for some items; they are getting better throughout the years - he urged passage. Brodt said that Chris Kelly of WNYO has money in the budget but there's a change breakdown. DiGioia called to question - 17:0:1 passes Bill 40.

NEW BUSINESS

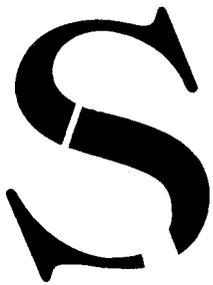

The 21st Meeting of the 31st Legislative Session was called to order at 6:49pm.

The roll was taken with the following senators absent : John Rowe, Steve Babson, Charles Barley, Thomas Company, Eugenia Charles, Ted Kramer, Elizabeth Linderberry, Saeed Smith, Rosanna Troncoso, Jeannien Wagner, Keith Washo, Brian Wekar. Later on in the meeting, Nicole DiToro proxies Salvatore Graziano.

There was an objection to the Agenda by Harmonie Schwartz, to place Bill 45 to Special Orders. It was granted. Kristi DiGioia objected also to strike Bill 43 out of Old Business. There was then an approval. Also there was an objection to the minutes to strike out the word 'and' before Chris Friskey's name in the roll of absentees. It was then approved.

EXECUTIVE REPORT

Chris Friskey announced that Interim President Deborah Stanley will be at next week's Senate meeting to answer any questions about the budget.

Friskey, along with Harmonie Schwartz, attended a program last weekend in Albany about the SUNY budget cuts. On Friday the 8th, there will be a speaker in the Ballroom, Edward Sullivan, to speak on behalf of the Rethinking SUNY program. It begins at 10am.

He also spoke about the restructuring the intermural sports program; there isn't full use of Lee Hall; other colleges have good programs like Cortland's was the best. The college is also trying to bring in a track coach. There is talk of renovating the entrance of Lee Hall or making into an atrium.

Chris Brodt - announced that on April 25, the Bare Naked Ladies is coming to the college at Laker Hall, 8pm. He also announced that the Senate is close to quorum.

Resolution #6 - Equal Treatment of Off-Campus Students - Senator Mirinda called to question - 19:1 passed the resolution.

Bill 41 - Funding of Asian Awareness Week - Senator Harmonie said that one speaker has been eliminated so just give them the one speaker, urge to quick passage. Senator Mirinda said that the ASA has a weak attempt with no activeness. Diogenes amended the bill by adding \$50 for hotel and living expenses, \$350 for travel which would make a grand total of \$530. Senator Strong said that the \$50 hotel was a generosity and should leave travel at \$200. Harmonie made an amendment to the amendment by striking #1 speakers expenses. There was a vote on this, 15:5 passes. A vote on the first amendment of hotel and living expenses was 8:12- fails. A speaker from the ASA, Jonathan, said the \$350 travel is needed to bring him up; he is coming by car from Colorado. Senator Strong said to strike the second 'Whereas' and replace the \$1210 figure from the 'Therefore..' clause, to \$380. He thinks this is fair. Senator Breen called to question on this change in the bill, 19:1 - passes. Senator Kristi called to question on the entire bill - 18:2-passes.

Bill 42 - Funding for Cheerleaders - Kristi withdrew from her sponsorship - Senator Mirinda read parts of the treasurer book and said that someone didn't do their job and thinks \$2000 is a lot to shell out. Senator Kristen said that this bill should be passed as is; they have worked hard this year. Senator Goldowsky agreed with Senator Mirinda; the Cheer Team should get all that money. Senator Williams said that fund raising is not easy, they worked hard and they look good for the college to send them to nationals. Senator Breen said they'll be receiving national attention for Oswego State. Senator Strong said they put a lot of effort in what they do. Senator McDermott amended to change \$2000 to 1300. A vote on that failed 6:14. Senator Goldowsky amended \$1300 to 1000 which passed 16:4. In the 'Therefore..' clause, \$1000 will replace the original amount and it will come out of Acct. 498. Senator Kristen felt that \$1300 was good but \$1000 is not. On the second speakers list, Senator Mirinda said they will be national recognized, but they broke the rules and

you pay; he urged to fail it. There was a call to question on Bill 42, 14:5-passes.

SPECIAL ORDERS

Bill 45 - Change of Accounts for Ozone Lights - As a sponsor, Chris Strong urged someone to amend the bill. Senator Kristi amended the 'Therefore' clause to read after 'college,' 'and return to Acct. 915.' That passed 20:0. Senator Kristen amended to strike the first amendment and add 'New York' after 'University'. That passed 20:0. A call to question made Bill 45 pass 20:0.

Bill 44 - Funds for Geology Club - where the club needs funding for their trip to the Jamesville Quarry. Their total cost is \$150.00 for gas and tolls. Submitted by David A. Winkler, V-P of the Geology Club. Sponsored by Chris Strong and Kristen Pizzarello.

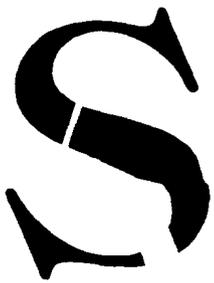

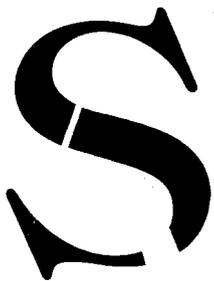

MINUTES

Before the meeting took place, Interim President Deborah Stanley spoke on behalf of the budget cuts on the SUNY system. Some of the other topics that were brought up the senators were : poor plowing of snow in parking lots, and stairways, e-mail accounts, the Oswegonian article and Off-Campus Students being "ignored," and some computers not usable.

Interim President Deborah Stanley first spoke about the budget cuts on the SUNY system. She is available in her office to discuss any problems that arise either about the budget or not. She encouraged students to write letters to the assembly people on how they feel about the SUNY cuts. More than 6% is being cut to SUNY which is over \$2.5 million. If this occurs there will have to be a cut back on services. There will be, however, a restoration of TAP. Deborah made it clear to the Senate to get people out there to voice their opinion and address the legislation. Student voice is very important. Although there has been a drop in SUNY applications, Oswego won't be "down" in students for this up-coming fall. The acceptance of bright and academic students is what Oswego looks for. This is a very highly competitive school. Also alumni can feel their degree still has a value to it even after a number of years. The graduate program at Oswego is one of the best in all of SUNY schools. The graduate students can assure themselves that the program will continue and hopefully will offer a MBA degree in the future.

Deborah then answered a few questions about the *Oswegonian* issue. She said that it was misinformation and did not attack the paper in the notice to students. There was no intention for it. It then lead onto the off-campus students and how they do not receive all mailings as on-campus students do. There is not enough money (for postage) to send to all off-campus students. Give her a strategy to inform students. A "Technology fee" was brought up. The administration has a decision upon that which will make students unhappy if this falls into place. Deborah stated that she would like to see the body ask questions and have request; tell her what you want and she'll look in to it. If she has to, she will come to every Senate meeting to answer any questions. The next incident was with the plowing of the snow, or lack thereof. The snow plowing this winter has been poor and nothing has been done about it. Deborah commented

about this and said that we are already into the 8th week of the semester and now it's brought. There needs to be more awareness of issues around campus. Lastly, Deborah Stanley's goal is to move resources and rewards in a way where student activeness comes together. Students and faculty together; bring academic and human development as one on campus.

After Deborah Stanley made her speech, the meeting came to order - 7:40pm. The roll was taken with the following senators absent: Steve Babson, Charles Barley, Christine Behringer, Thomas Company, Eugenia Charles, Ted Kramer, Elizabeth Linderberry, Benson Orenca, Saeed Smith, Rosanna Troncoso, Jeannien Wagner, Keith Washo, Brian Wekar, Lyndsey Williams. There was an objection to the minutes with the structure of the second last sentence of the third paragraph. There was an approval of the minutes and agenda.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:53.



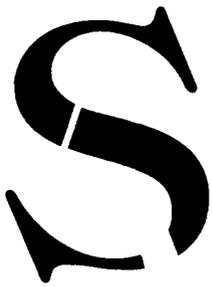

The 23rd Meeting of the 31st Legislative Session was called to order at 7pm.

The roll was taken with the following senators absent : a proxy for Salvatore Graziano was Rob DiCerbo, Roy Mirenda, Steve Babson, Diogenes Delos Santos, a proxy was for Brendan Hanlon, Charles Barley, Christine Behringer, Eugenia Charles, Ted Kramer, Elizabeth Linderberry, Benson Orenca, Saeed Smith, Jeannien Wagner, Keith Washo, Brian Wekar, Lyndsey Williams.

The quorum was lowered to 15 and there was an approval of the agenda and minutes.

EXECUTIVE REPORTS

Chris Friskey congratulated the newly elected officers for the 1996-97 term. Chris then introduced the Dean. He spoke about how student notices to residence halls should be posted properly where students can see them and also posting to the *Oswegonian*. It was then brought up about the phone directories and how they can be a problem. They are, however, available in different locations on campus. Taryn Breen - urged people to look at last years legislative statistics.

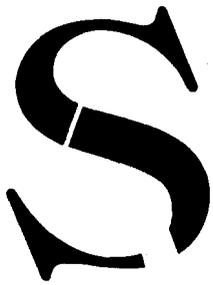
