MINUTES

The 1st meeting of the 25th Legislative Session was called to order at 6:04 p.m.

The roll was taken with no Senators absent.

The agenda was approved without changes.

The minutes were approved with the following changes: Bylaw and Judy announced to the Senate that Burrill Wells mom is now Mayor of Baldwinsville.

EXECUTIVE REPORT

Susan Cirello swore the Senators into office for the new Legislative Session. Susan Cirello swore Dan Murphy and Emilio Dorcelly in as President and Vice President for the 25th Legislative Session.

Dan Murphy: Would like to speak with the new senators after tonight's Senate meeting.

-This year is the Student Association's Anniversary. It is a year for continued progress. Dan is proud to represent the students. He would like to upgrade the organization of SA, better inform students about SA, try to bring the campus closer together, and issue a SA monthly newsletter. These are not easy tasks, they will require a lot of hard work. The Senate must work together.

-Dan announced the following appointments: Jamie Bishop as President's Assistant, and Paul Austin as Coordinator of Student Activities.

-There will be a phone-in this weekend in the SA office. Students will be calling officials to talk about the budget issue.

-Arlette told Dan that hopefully \$15-20 million will be restored out of the \$47 million cut. The Legislature will most likely decide on the budget on April 15th.

-Dan met with Bernie Henderson and Frank Mazzoli about the shuttle bus. Dan wants the Auxiliary Services to open the shuttle for bids. It is Dan's feeling that the Golden Sun Bus Company is not providing the service asked for. He wants a new shuttle bus.

-There may be another parking lot built. It would be built across from Hart Hall by the Newman Center. This would have to be environmentally safe. They will raise the money to build the parking lot through an increase in the parking fee, or the faculty and staff will be charged to park now.

-Dan and Emilio would like to have a retreat by the end of April for the new Senators.

-Dan encourages the Senators to meet with Dan at least once in his office before the semester ends.

WOZZ: Dan is hoping that it will be on the agenda for the next Board of Trustees Meeting which is April 26th. If approved by the Board, then it will go to Washington D.C. where it has to be approved by the FCC. Then we can start building and it will be on the air in the fall.

-Take Back The Night march is tonight. Dan encourages everyone to walk.

-Dan looks forward to working with everyone.

Emilio Dorcely: Emilio went over how a Senate meeting is run and briefly reviewed tonight's agenda.

-Next week Emilio will pass around a sheet so that the Senators can sign up for a committee. Each Senator must belong to one committee.

-Emilio informed the Senate that if a student does not pay his/her phone bill, they cannot register for classes.

-Tomorrow morning at 10:00 there will be a telephone committee meeting.

MINUTES

The 2nd meeting of the 25th Legislative Session was called to order at 6:05 p.m.

The roll was taken with the following people absent: Paul Westfall, Kenneth Kolton, Greg Shepard, Jennifer Greenwood, Mary Ann McGetrick, Thomas Rockwood, Paul Sexton, Timothy Hayes, Patrick Holmes, and Burrill wells.

The remaining Senators were sworn in by Mark Donovan the Associate Justice.

The agenda was approved with the following change: change March to April.

The minutes were approved with no changes.

EXECUTIVE REPORTS

Dan Murphy: Welcome everyone!

-Dan hopes for a better turnout next week. It should be a Senators priority to attend meetings.

-Dean Wassenaar gave an update on the measles situation. A week ago Thursday a student went to the Health Center with symptoms of the measles. It has not been confirmed yet. Blood tests take a long time so that antibodies show up in the blood. Up to 4000 students have been voluntarily immunized at this point. If the case is confirmed on Friday, mandatory immunization or proof of prior immunization will be required. Shots will be given in the Hewitt Union Ballroom Saturday, Sunday and Monday. Tuesday morning it will be mandatory to present a green card to enter any building on campus. Anyone under 32 will be immunized. Those persons who cannot be immunized will be given Gamma Globulin shots. An over 32 station may be set up for those students over 32 who know they have had the measles to obtain a green card. Two weeks after the appearance of the rash on the last person, the campus will then be free of the measles. Dean Wassenaar also

added to his report that persons will then be free of the measles. Dean Wassenaar also added to his report that persons with over \$50 owed to the campus will not be allowed to register. Those with under \$50 owed to the campus will be given 30 days to pay, then their registration will be cancelled.

-Dan says that Wally Haskell is not pleased with the comments made in The Oswegonian. Wally wants a schedule for the Golden Sun Bus Company. Mike Flaherty wants the buses to run continuously. Dan wishes for a schedule to be made so that he can say that Bus A was not at point B at time C for example. There will be a Parking Committee meeting tomorrow. Dan will give a new schedule to Wally.

-John Valby, "Dr. Dirty" will not be performing on campus as scheduled. Due to his very vulgar songs, sexism, and racism in his act, his contract to perform here on April 19th has been cancelled. His contracts have also been cancelled at SUNY Albany, and Binghamton. In Binghamton there have been threats against his life. Judy Krebs signed the original contract, it is her duty not to censor. The two chairs of PPB Impromptu feel strongly that he should come and perform at Oswego. If there is a large outrage at performance, performance would be cancelled. Dr. Weber called a meeting. He wants the performance to be cancelled because it condones racism and sexist statements. Dr. LeFlore warned of a race riot. Dan Murphy, Emilio Dorcelly, Sue Curran, and Jim Versteeg unanimously agreed to cancel the performance.

-Miss-A-Meal Thursday April 27th, dinner. Money will go to one of the following: Children's Heart Association(through Phi Kappa Tau), Hidden Acres Wildlife Association, Park-It-In-Oswego, or Farnham.

-Thursday April 13th-Press Conference at SUNY Cortland on the SUNY budget (11 a.m.). Cuomo in the Inside Albany, spoke against restoring SUNY's funds. It is most likely that there will be a \$200 increase in tuition, the Governor is suggesting a \$500-\$700.

-Applications for all S.A. positions are due Friday.

-"Dean Wassenaar is a fugitive from the law" Muscular Dystrophy Association has an arrest program in which they raise bail money for the MDA. Please help post bail for him.

-The Agenda for the year is as follows:

1. Parking problem-improving the shuttle committee, look into building more lots.
2. Safety-3-4 more call boxes in the next year. More lighting on campus.
3. Unite the groups on campus, activities fair, organizational meetings.
4. Residence Hall budgets.
5. Multicultural issues, curriculum.

6. Upgrade the media on campus, 3 year plan.
7. Better inform students (especially off-campus and non-trads) about what S.A. is and where the money goes. S.A. newsletter.

Emilio Dorcely: The new constitutions do not have the following bylaw, please add:

Bylaw 11: No club or organization shall be funded unless it submits a line-by-line budget request, that fully explains and breaks down the amount being requested. Each line-by-line request must be approved by the S.A. Senate or appealed to the full Senate.

-Emilio explained the various committees.

Finance: looks at financial aspects of bills

Elections: runs all campus elections, takes care of other election matters

Student Services: anything related to student services

College Community: better relations between college and community (Switch Day)

Rules: gives recommendations on constitutionality of bills

Environmental Action: environmental concerns on campus

Each Senator must sit on at least one committee!

The 3rd meeting of the 25th Legislative Session was called to order at 6:05 p.m.

The roll was taken with the following people absent: Laura Tendler (with proxy), Kelly O'Brien, Amy Armstrong, Thomas Rockwood, and Laura McCaully.

The minutes were approved with no changes.

The agenda was approved with the following changes: March changed to April, and #7; New Business Bills #1, #2, #3, and #4.

EXECUTIVE REPORTS

Dan Murphy: Miss-A-Meal: Will be split between Farnham and Park It-Oswego. Reasons for choosing are, Farnham is a big help to Oswego students with its hotline. Dan introduced Eileen Eisworth the Executive Director of Farnham. Farnham depends on the College. They would like a good Public Relations program with the College. A large number of calls are from the College. Out of 20 volunteers, 18 are college students. Farnham offers good career opportunities for volunteers. People may not know about Farnham because they usually promote from within. Farnham appreciates the support with the man-power the campus provides and now the funding they will receive. The money will go to the hotline and the coordinator for the hotline counselor. If anyone is interested in volunteering, call Dawn Krupa at 342-4489. Park It-Oswego: Dan chose this organization because it helps improve college-community relations. It will show the community that we care. He introduced Deb Doran. Park It-Oswego is a volunteer organization. She feels the kids are the future. Robert Lethers met with elementary students on March 30th. They are the children who helped design it. Mr. Lethers invites college students to help build it in the fall. May 1st-3rd for Breitbeck-\$30,000. West Park will be \$50,000. Funding is coming from fund raisers throughout the community. The State budget has been finalized-\$20,000,000 restored out of the original \$47,000,000 cut. Does include \$200 tuition hike. Parking fee still in the budget but is still up in the air. Sixteen positions will be cut.

WTOP: Submitted 3-year plan for upgrading their services. Dan invites people to come into his office to look it over.

The 4th meeting of the 25th Legislative Session was called to order at 6:03 p.m.

The roll was taken with the following people absent: Charla Janice.

The minutes were approved with the following changes: Resolution #4: This resolution should be passed general consent. Res. #4; Resolution. Public Comments and Announcements: 101 Lanighan.

The agenda was approved with no changes.

EXECUTIVE REPORTS

Dan Murphy: Friday, May 12th: Exchange Day with the community. There will be a reception in Tyler Hall at 6:30, a tour of Lanighan studios and a special musical performance.

Judy Krebs came to speak about her meeting with Mario Cuomo. Judy and other student representatives met with Mario Cuomo on Friday. This was the first meeting in five years. They talked with him about whether he should veto the tuition or not. Judy briefly explained the budget process to the new Senate. Governor Cuomo explained to those at the meeting that he supports higher education. They told him that his belief does not hold up with the reality of the SUNY budget. They did not accept his choices of either; 1. veto the tuition-which would lead to a smaller university or 2. have a \$200 tuition increase-this would set a bad precedent. Judy and others believe that he has created unfair choices. They also made demands on the Governor. Some of these demands were: 1. For the Governor to hold quarterly meetings with SASU 2. to have the committees on campuses involved with the formulation of the school budget. That way the students will create priorities for the university, and 3. that the next 3 appointments made, be SUNY graduates (he liked this idea). This meeting was a tremendous triumph for students across the State. Judy says that Governor Cuomo is hurt by what the students are doing politically.

The Latin Student Union showed two video tapes to promote their concert/dance club this weekend, Saturday, April 27th.

Miss-A-Meal: Students can still sign up tomorrow for Miss-A-Meal.

Dan met with Dean Wassenaar and Mike Flaherty today. They are in the process of writing up a contract for the shuttle bus. They feel they will receive good bids.

Interviews will be conducted for the Auxiliary Board and Minority Affairs. There will be appointments by May 1st.

Monday, April 29th: Clubs and organization convention in the Formal Lounge of the Hewitt Union.

SA Conference: May 4th at Albany. Any Senators are welcome to go!

Dan will be receiving a list from provost concerning the administration committees.

Jim Smith and Paul Cassetta have been appointed Legal Aide internships. Congratulations.

Emilio Dorcely: Emilio announced that he would accept nominations for Pro-temp. This person would run the Senate meetings whenever Emilio is absent. Amy Armstrong made a motion for nominations. Accepted. The following people were nominated: Jim Smith, Rustin Morse, Patrick Holmes, and Willie Shirer. Ballots were passed out to all of the Senators. The first vote narrowed the candidates down to Patrick Holmes and Rustin Morse. The final vote conducted determined Patrick Holmes to be the new Pro-Temp for the 25th Legislative Session.

Senators please pick up a list of new Senators. Emilio passed out Consumer Information Catalogs to all of the Senators.

There are still some Senators who have not yet signed up for committees. Jim Smith and Rustin Morse are the co-chairs for the Finance Committee, Angela Natoli is the chair for the College Community Relations Committee, Patrick Holmes is the chair for the Rules Committee, and Kevin Wallace and Greg Shepard are the co-chairs for the Environmental Action Committee. There is still a chair open for the Student Services Committee.

The Senate voted on allocating a lot of money to the LSU for their Concert/Dance club. As student leaders we should go and get involved. We voted on it, so go to it!

Kelly O'Brien: The SASU referendum was passed 7 to 1 on this campus. SASU Central does not know about this. Urges friendly ammendments to be made.

Jerome Duval: This bill speaks for itself. SASU represents us. It provides us with useful and effective information that affects us.

Amy Armstrong: Friendly Ammendment to change the "Be it enacted that the Student Association Senate of the State University of New York College at Oswego grant the SASU students representative from Oswego a speaking seat on Student Association Senate. This Friendly Ammendment was accepted. Amy is upset that Ron Williams, the SASU delegate is not here tonight. He submitted the bill and should therefore show support for it.

Christopher Hallen: SASU has had the right to speak at Senate meetings through Senate reports and other Senators. SASU should not have the right to a speaking seat, this would be a biased relationship.

Rustin Morse: How do you select who will be speaking? We have to be careful about who we are giving seats to. Anyone who wishes to speak at our meetings can. SASU does not need a seat to speak. How do we decide what they can speak on? Time does not permit this.

Patrick Holmes: Rustin's argument is a valid one. We do have a time constraint on our meetings. We can yield the floor to someone. Patrick agrees with Rustin.

Paul Westfall: This is our SA. They are already allowed to speak. Will this impede our progress as a Senate?

Kelly O'Brien: We should be able to use our own minds. We will not lose control or power if we give them a speaking seat.

Ed Cohen: A SASU delegate will have pertinent information. We are the voice of people on this campus, they are a voice of us.

Christopher Hallen: Call to question.
Vote: 12Y, 12N, 2A. Motion passed.

Jim Smith: Made a motion to reconsider the vote.
Vote to reconsider the vote: 15Y, 9N, 1A.

Rustin Morse: SASU is a lobby organization for students throughout the state. How can we have a group that lobbies also have a speaking seat.

Laura Tendler: We should reconsider this speaking seat, not voting seat. We will not lose control. We should hear all views.

Jim Smith: This seat is important. It will be for an Oswego representative to speak about SASU.

Willie Shirer: No one is clearly against this bill. People are against this person speaking on Oswego bills. This representative should speak only on bills on the state level.

Patrick Holmes: Worried about precedence. SASU is another government organization. We have time constraints in meetings.

Christopher Hallen: SASU representative has always had an opportunity to speak. Why change now.

Dr. Button: The SASU representative has always had ample time to share their views. Keep in mind the precedence issue.

Angela Natoli: Her concern is precedence. There is no real purpose to give a speaking seat to SASU. Why vote on giving them something they already have.

Amy Armstrong: SASU does not exist without us. We are a part of it. Their main job is representing us in Albany. This bill would make it easier for the representative to take part in our discussion. This bill will not make them talk more.

Ed Cohen: We have all lobbied. Anyone can become its own political entity.

Jerome Duval: Call to question. Objected.
It is important to us to realize that SASU represents us. Time is not a factor here. This will keep us more politically inclined on what affects us.

Kelly O'Brien: We are here to represent our constituents not ourselves. We can use their information or not. Remember our constituents voted on the SASU referendum 7 to 1.

Rustin Morse: No one has been appointed yet, there is no direct constituency.

Angela Notoli: The State Senate does not have a speaking seat in the Federal government. Just because we are a part of something greater, does not mean they should have a speaking seat in our Senate. They already have that privilege.

Laura Tendler: Friendly Amendment: To add in the "Be it enacted" that the representative can only speak on SASU orientated bills. This motion fails because the Senate cannot limit a speaking seat.

Patrick Holmes: Move to question.
Vote to end debate: clearly passes.
Vote on Bill #2: 15Y, 11N, 1A. Bill #2 Passed.

The 5th meeting of the 25th Legislative Session was called to order at 6:05 p.m.

The roll was taken with the following Senators absent: Greg Shepard, Willie Shirer (with proxy) Laura Tandler (with proxy), Amy Armstrong, Thomas Rockwood, Burrill Wells, Dr. Button, and Paul Sexton.

The minutes were approved with the following changes: page 3, Paul Westfall-This will impede our progress.

The agenda was approved with no changes.

EXECUTIVE REPORT

Dan Murphy: Apologizes about being late tonight. He had dinner with Dr. Button tonight.

The following appointments have been made: Sophomore seat-Laura Carroll, Senior seat-Juan Decker, Auxiliary Services seat-Rob Moravis and Director of Finance-Michelle Petit. Congratulations to all!

Dan will make the appointment for the Director of Minority Affairs next week. He has not received all of the votes yet from the various groups.

Governor Cuomo has vetoed the tuition increase. This increase was supposed to restore the states debt. The money needed may now come from revenue making bills. There also may be cuts made across campus. This veto is a victory for students. Dan is going to Albany tomorrow with Emilio and Paul Austin to talk about the tuition increase.

Rustin Morse: Call to question. Objected.

Improvements were made to make this event a success. They gave us a rough estimate on how much will be given to the United Way. Rustin does not see a problem with this bill.

Patrick Holmes: Formal ammendment to add another Be it further enacted.

Be it further enacted that 15% of the proceeds be returned to the SA, up to \$1750. This is a good event, but if it is money making, a little should be returned to the SA.

Rustin Morse: Against formal ammendment. The money made will be returned back to the students through the Greek organizations. This ammendment will set a bad precedence.

Charla Janice: Against formal ammendment. If you want to feel satisfaction this is not the way. Make a stipulation to give United Way 30% of the proceeds.

Christopher Hallen: Against formal ammendment. Cannot see asking for money back. We should just give them the money. The proceeds are going to a charitable cause.

Dan Murphy: The issue here is not whether money will be made or not. It is fine to increase the rate of money going to charity.

Bob Caulkins: The carnival is good for college/community relations. The percentage of proceeds being given to the United Way is a little ambiguous.

Tom Lonquist: The precedence has been never to fund the greek organizations. Patrick's ammendment is not out of line. Funds have been abused in the past. The carnival is a good idea. This will set a precedence for greeks to be funded. Consider this ammendment.

Jim Smith: Move to question.

Patrick Holmes: Looks forward to the event. If this bill is not tabled, he hopes it passes.

Ken Craft: Suggests that the greeks utilize the box office to sell tickets.

Kelly O'Brien: WTOP is an excellent operation. If we don't fund this it won't be able to run. Everything on this list is needed. We can't take away pieces.

Bob Gaffney: Steve is taking WTOP forward, and he wants to move cable off-campus. He wants to tie in community with campus.

Chris Hallen: Students who work there are looking for a career in this so this will help.

Angela Natoli: Checking to see if I could donate anything, \$589.68 in tapes? I would like to recommend a friendly ammendment to get rid of \$589.68.

MINUTES

The 7th meeting of the 25th Legislative Session was called to order at 6:09 p.m.

The roll was taken with the following Senators absent: Jennifer Greenwood, Chris Hummel, and Tom Lonquist.

The minutes and agenda were approved with no changes.

EXECUTIVE REPORT

Dan Murphy:

Welcomes everyone back and explained what he did over Summer Vacation.

This is the 25th Anniversary of SA and there are many positions that need to be filled.

We have a new Yellow Bus Shuttle Co. and everything seems to be running fine except the driver drives slowly.

A cap was put on the parking fee until Spring Semester making the parking fee only ten dollars. The fee may increase during the second semester to \$100.00. There are still 200 spots by Sheldon Hotel because the Hotel hasn't opened yet.

WOZZ is still being worked on. We are trying to get this on the FM airwaves. It will be up for approval in October by the Board of Trustees in Albany. Dan, and President Weber will try to persuade trustees to vote in favor of this.

Judy Krebs was elected as SASU President. Judy explained how the budget was left after school adjourned. The tuition increase was vetoed, however there is still a \$28 million gap. She then accounted for where the money was cut from. To make up for the \$28 million gap there are three ideas - parking fee of \$125.00, third party payment of doctor fees, and the study abroad program students must pay for everything. This year the budget will look

as bad or worse. One year from now we will need a \$1 million increase in order to have the same services. Now we need to have a large number of students register so we can be vocal in voting matters and stop tuition increases. My phone number is (518)465-2406. Also be aware of the Ray Glass Conference at SUNY Purchase on October 20-22.

Dan learned alot while in Berkley. The House and Senate reauthorization programs are re-done every five years. We need to speak to our assembly people and tell them what we want as students. Members of the SUNY delegation put in a resolution to increase colored people seats from 2 to 5. The Midwest protested and it was not passed. I also got new ideas for SADD and other organizations.

I gave speeches to Freshman and parents at Fall Convocation. Fourteen thousand applicants this year for Oswego and only 1400 were accepted. We had the most applications from a SUNY school.

Senators that are working on the Residence Life Budget tell us that everything is great.

Paul Austin, Coordinator of Student Activities spoke. He talked about the "Go SA" campaign because this is our 25th Anniversary. Students that are transfers are invited to Fallbrook for food and to get acquainted with other students. It's being held from 3-8 p.m. on Saturday. Please come! There are hundreds of Freshmen who want to get involved. WTOP is having it's grand reopening with all its' new equipment. I'm also looking forward to working closely with the Greeks and the community.

President Weber is looking for ideas for improvement for the college. Some ideas were put into a book. Look the book over and be ready to talk with President Weber.

We are all invited to see the art in Tyler Art Gallery after the meeting.

The Senate meeting was held out here because Room 212 is too small but it is too noisy out here.

I talked to Dan Clark who charters buses and I'll leave his name and number.

Emilio Dorcely: We will try to work out a good place to have meetings. Sorry about the noise.

There is talk about Annexation. Right now we are part of Oswego Town. The Town gets money for us. If we annex we take on the title of Oswego City as opposed to town. We would have a 3% increase in taxes however. Three thousand students who could vote in city and local issues. With 3000 students we could block vote on important issues. We will talk about it and I will put a packet together.

Senators no longer have to share mailboxes, please check your mailbox 2 or 3 times a week. This is your access to students on and off campus.

There are many Senator positions open. Four on-campus and nine off-campus. Monday and Tuesday we will hold elections for off-campus Senators Monday and Tuesday, September 18 and 19.

Wednesday, September 20, 1989 there will be a Senate retreat. September 22 weekend either Saturday or Sunday there will be a program of "How to" on parliamentary procedures. Everyone needs to attend.

We are trying to create a Senate bulletin board in all halls. Please post all information that you get so students know what is going on in SA.

The 8th meeting of the 25th Legislative Session was called to order at 6:10 p.m.

The roll was taken with the following Senators absent: Ken Kolton, and the Dean of Students.

The minutes were approved with the following changes: Omit defecating p.3, Palladium p.3, and toilet facilities will be available p. 3.

The agenda was approved with no changes.

EXECUTIVE REPORT

Dan Murphy: The situation with the forks in the road is as follows:

1. Thirty-eight people were arrested and 17 were students. Police chief said he would continue to have police down there.
2. The issue is bigger than just the drinking age. During the election time there are more arrests. Either they should enforce the regulations to the tee or relax them.
3. I don't think we have enough say. Student voices must be heard. We can alter many wards. We need the respect of the aldermen and to bring this to the college community. We need the respect for our students. If ANYONE is defecating or has an open can, please prosecute them. At the college community meeting I've talked about registering people to be designated drivers. This would be good publicity for SADD and us. Ed and I will talk to local bar owners and the Mayor said he would support us. The minority of the students here drink.

Auxiliary Services first board meeting is coming up, SASU conference, WOZZ, Grow Conference are all coming up.

Geniveve O'Connor: This is a SASU alert. There was an incident in New Paltz over the summer where 7 black students and 1 white

student were arrested and beaten for playing a radio too loud. They were charged with government administration obstruction of the law. In protest the students sat down in order to save their limbs. Their hearing was postponed until October 16, 1989. Various students came to support the New Paltz Coalition at Oswego for related biased incidents. Also a reminder that the Grow Weekend is this weekend and Ray Glass is coming up. Teddy will talk to you about voter registration and how important it is. The voter registration bill got out of the Assembly and to the Senate committee. Keep your ears and eyes open.

Task force committees- the college is attempting to enter a relationship with the Greek Community. GSC and Faculty have a meeting Friday.

Telephone Committee will be restructuring the rates on this campus.

Ron Guiles will be leaving us.

Personal Safety Task Force will try to get more blue light transmitters by asking for money from the same groups as last year.

ABC (Alcohol Beverage Committee)-If you are under 21 as of January you can be arrested for possession of alcohol.

Please feel free to join any of these committees. Thank you.

Emilio Dorecely: I went to the BSU meeting Thursday. At the meeting they went over how some of the students went to New Paltz and talked to the students who were involved with the arrest. Ray Dawson did a short re-enactment of how it happened. We need a sponsor for New Paltz - Chris Hallen and Paul Westfall pick up sponsorship.

There will be a detailed report from 1972 about Annexation; what it is, numbers, how to annex. Will there be a tax increase in tuition and roomrate as well. The students will have an extra 300 votes. Please read the packet.

I would like to start an SA Newsletter. Every Senator will be required to write at least one article during the year. We will also need editors.

SA will have a Senate Retreat on Sunday, September 24th. We will learn parliamentary procedures, how much money is in various accounts and how the entire SA works. You must be at the Senate retreat on Sunday from 11-4 p.m. it will be held at Fallbrook.

Ed Cohen: Finance Committee financed Bill #42. In the past we have funded other things fully that are of a National scope. To have people fund 55% is a bad idea and I am against the friendly amendment.

Dr. Button: There is a fiscal consideration that it is a club. Can our treasury stand all these trips? You must sort through this.

Dan Murphy Yields to Vicki Abrams: 77% cut to housing. Eight thousand people were affected by this. Information will be handed out and I urge you to support this.

Jim Smith: friendly ammendment from Account #915 to Account # .
Mike Tadros accepts this.

Rustin Morse: Call to question.

Vote to pass Bill #16 as ammended: 23Y, 4N, 1A
Bill #16 clearly passes.



The 10th meeting of the 25th Legislative Session was called to order at 6:10 p.m.

The roll was taken with the following Senators absent: Kevin Wallace, and the Dean.

The minutes were approved with the following changes: p.3 Mike Tadros, p.2 Program Fund Hearing, p. 4 bored.

The agenda was approved with no changes.

EXECUTIVE REPORT

Dan Murphy: Is there anyone here to appeal budgets? Noone was here to do this.

Dr. Bruce Johnston, the Chancellor SUNY NY, will be here Wednesday to discuss student issues. Dan can take 3 people, Emilio can take 3 people and Michelle also 3. We will meet at 10 a.m.

Dan spoke of taking the Senate on the road and bringing it to various residence halls. Are you interested? Let me know.

The Parking Committee reviewed the amount of cars and there are 216 Freshman cars and the majority are on Lakeside. If we permit these Freshmen to park on the west side of campus, then this would open up the mudlots for commuter parking once the Hotel is in operation. Ed Cohen questions the safety factor of this. This has not been finalized.

There is a search for someone to be in charge of Public Safety. There have been two interviews so far and there are two more to go. Susan at Stonybrook and Larry Garrick are both very qualified.

There are proposals for Miss-A-Meal benefactors now in progress. Last year the benefactors were Park It and AIDS Task Force. This year I would like to see it go towards the United Way since we have supported them for the past six years. I will leave this up to Senators.

Rustin Morse yields to Dave Levisis: The board is dying. We fixed the major problem but eventually we will need a new one. If FCC licensed, we will need a new board, sound proofing, and a table that must be a certain size. There are other boards that are cheaper than this. It is located in Syracuse for easy repairs if we need them. There is a patch pattern which we need for emergency broadcasting system. The CD player can be used in homes but it is FCC approved. The speaker monitor and the swivel chairs are needed. Steve Simmons will charge us \$20 for labor as opposed to the normal rate of \$50/an hour. He will be contracted through SUNY Oswego. George: Murphy and I finally have a chance to get the appeal after 6 years of lobbying.

Rustin Morse: As well as experience it will provide an education. No control over accident is possible. Things are apt to break. This is a 20 year old board and sooner or later it was apt to break and it must have been taken great care of. These are dedicated students who come and work at 3 or 9 in the morning on Saturday or Sunday. I urge this be passed.

Ed Cohen: We see how they need the money. They are down there every hour on the hour. Where a high school station is better than a college station, this is sad.

Dan Murphy: I concur with what Ed and Rustin have said. This equipment will be on our insurance policy. This has been a long wait. WRVO is not a student run organization. We need to train people in broadcasting. We'll debate it within the Board of Trustees. Please don't leave WOZZ in the cold.

Angela Natoli: I would like to speak against the friendly recommendation. I would like it to be changed from 3 to 2 chairs. The 2 chairs would be beneficial for interviews.

Jim Smith: I would like to table this bill.
All in favor of tabling Bill #17: 6Y, 26N, OA.
The motion clearly fails.

Jim Smith: I don't think anyone has taken it upon themselves to research this.

Michelle Petit: I encourage that you check and go see WOZZ. I urge you to make a friendly ammendment for the one swivel chair.

Randy: I am familiar with the new board and I am ready to vote on this.

Dr. Button: What is the entire price tag of this if they get their FCC license. I was against the FCC license because there wasn't any money. I speak in favor of the bill however and for funding it.

Rose Erdle: I would like to make a friendly ammendment to include the entire list of items, and to change 3 chairs to 1. The price is now \$11,837.35. Rustin accepts this.

Rustin Morse calls to question.
Vote on Bill #17: 31Y, ON, 1A.
Bill #17 clearly passes.

Bill #18

Finance: Friendly/formal ammendment for each member to pay \$15.00.
Rules: Waived
Sponsors: Chris Hallen

Chris Hallen yields to Colleen Sullivan: This was done by the AIDS Task Force. There are about 110 squares with the stories of various types of people who were victims of AIDS. This is the last time the quilt will be shown in its entirety. One in 500 people tests positive for the HIV virus. Seventeen people on this campus carry AIDS. This disease is about you, me and our children. It is killing off people by the hundreds of thousands. Students attending this will be given a quick training session. We also thought about making a slide presentation. This is not whether or not we can monitarily afford to fund this trip.

Chris Hallen: This was very controversial because of the organization that is submitting the bill. These are students who deserve the money. Budget Council could have funded this themselves.

Ed Cohen: I would like to make a friendly ammendment to make the total \$1,021.12 This was accepted by Chris. This is a hideous disease. It doesn't discriminate against anyone.

Dan Murphy: I am in favor of this bill. The quilt is growing. This disease affects our generation. We must be careful of our partners and the protection that we use. We must also deal with the Gay and Lesbian Communities. We must have a certain sensitivity. They are part of American Society and our Community. If we can't deal with it, who can? I am in great support of this bill. I would like members to pay \$15.00 as a subsidy.

Kathleen Rowse: I would like to make a friendly ammendment to have the 14 people to pay \$15.00 changing the total to \$811.12. Chris accepts this. This bill should pass this is a vital issue.

Dr. Button: I can't think of any other issues that are any more important than this one. We can bring back more information to everyone.

Paul Westfall: The issue is whether to send or not to send a few people to get information on a quilt.

Angela Natoli: They would only LIKE to give a presentation. I am against this bill.

Michelle Petit: Perhaps 45% subsidy should go towards this. I recommend that someone put some rational behind the \$15.00.

Rose Erdle: I would like to make a friendly ammendment after the last whereas add: the students will bring back a slide show. Chris accepts this. My constituents would like to see the presentation.

Sue Aldrich: \$1,000.00 is a lot of money and I think something should be done.

Ted Bunce: People are volunteering their time to help people find various squares on the quilt. They will need transportation and the money for food. In the past SA has sent organizations on trips. There have been those trips that do not have an educational value.

Ken Kolton: My constituents cannot see sending a group of people to Washington to see a quilt.

Angela Natoli: We set a precedent last week and I urge you to make it by person like last week.

Kathleen Rowse: Calls to question.
Vote to pass Bill #18: 21Y, 9N, 0A.
Bill #18 clearly passes.

Bill #19

Finance: no report

Ken Kolton: There is no reason why this should not pass. I am in favor of this bill.



EXECUTIVE REPORT

Dan Murphy: I got a phone call from Judy Krebs and was asked to be one of the three SA Presidents to meet with Governor Mario Cuomo at Brockport on Wednesday. We will talk about parking, tuition, the cut in enrollment and the Chancellors 2,000 plan where he proposes to freeze tuition. I do not think I was chosen because of my relationship with Judy.

Miss-A-Meal: Carolyn Jeffernan for the Special Olympics: I am presently doing an internship for the Special Olympics. We raise money only by fund raisers. Karen Ventrilla yields to Julie Liszka: We are going to D.C. for an education. We are only asking students to pay for buses. Everyone is related to the Roe vs. Wade case. This case is in fear of being reversed. Both pro/anti choice people are allowed to go on this trip. We will bring back information. Karen: I am in very strong support of this bill. People think this is a country club but it is not. We are going down there to state how we feel.

Paul Westfall: I would like to make a formal Ammendment to cut everything down to 0.

Rustin Morse: I am against this ammendment and I hope it is not passed.

Ken Kolton: In order to voice our concern, everyone has information and education they want to receive. We need to draw the line.

Trenice West: Many people are being narrow minded and think this formal ammendment should not be passed.

Kevin Wallace: In an effort to get awareness up I think this was an interesting move, however; this undermines the concept of what we are trying to accomplish. There are a great number of people who have signed the petition. This is an educational experience.

Mike Tadros: This is not a game. The people will come back and give a presentation. This is a crazy ammendment.

Dave Chick: To fund this at 0 is utterly ridiculous. The Senate did pay for this last year but students were unable to go.

Sue Aldrich: Regardless of this bill we cannot keep giving away trips to D.C.

Chris Hallen: Call to question.
There is an objection.

Vote to end debate: 18Y, 10N, 2A.

Vote to pass Bill #26: 2Y, 25N, 4A.

The bill with the Formal Ammendment clearly fails.

Laura Carroll: I am in support of this bill. Perhaps we should send noone down to the rally or have the rally here at the Union.

Scott White: SA is not a travel agency. If people have nothing to show for it when they come back, is it worth it to send them? Perhaps we can subsidize for 45%. Printing an article in The Oswegonian is useless because students will flip through and read what they like. GALA had to come back and give a slide presentation. No precedent has been set. If so many people want to go then they will pay \$20-25.

Jim Smith: I would like to make a formal ammendment to change \$10.00 to \$20.00.

Rustin Morse: Any trip anywhere Senate must look if it is a primary educational need. Students should be grateful that we spend 50%, this is very generous. Back in the 60's students would jump in their cars and protest, they did not come to SA. You can't always get what you want. I don't have \$20.00 to go out and drink every week so I don't go out and drink.

Ed Cohen: \$56.50 per semester is a lot for some students to pay. This money can be their contribution.

Trenice West: I do not think that all the men here are being fair. Students have a right to go where they want. I am against the formal ammendment to pay \$20.00.

Ted Bunce: We are asking members of the Women's Center to pay \$20.00 instead of \$15.00.

Scott White: If people truly want to go, they will pay the money.

Dr. Button: I am in favor of an educational trip. All groups should be treated equally. I do not think we have layed down any ground rules, there are a couple of things you should consider. How many times have we supported this group? What are the common elements? (i.e. percent of student contribution, report back to students). What amount can we contribute at this rate? Some sensible and rational decision can be made if we come up with these standards.

Laura Carroll: Last week we passed a bill to see hockey games get put on television.

John Doherty: Allotting money should be gone about in a certain way. Organizations can be funded for trips. Clubs can find ways to finance things. Equal accessibility to all money.

Laura Carroll: Asking for \$20.00 is discrimination. This is placing those who are wealthier above those who are less fortunate.

Emilio Dorcely: How and what will be fair. People are not thinking clearly. We all like to go to athletics. Is it athletics or education that is more important here? We complain about our country. If you truly believe that education is more important than take a stance. People come to college for a reason.

Randy Shea: I am in favor of sending these people to D.C. Education is the experience in what they are learning. When it is an issue that will come back to affect us, than I think it is important. I would like to see the formal ammendment fail and go to \$15.00.

Chris Hallen: The debate is going around in a circle. Anything can be education. Hockey can be contrived as education. This was seen as a primary educational need in my constituency. Some guidelines should be set. We are fiscally loose. We can not recall any of the trips we sent people on last year.

Kevin Wallace: There are several valid points here. My constituency is in favor of this bill. If we are not informed we are not doing a good job. Athletes and all policies should be standardized. Everyone should get as much out of SA as possible. Everyone needs money. There should be a way that is equally fair to all.

Abner Jean-Pierre: People going to D.C. are representing their own interests.

Ron Williams: Please look at the importance of this bill. They are representing women. Middle class males make all the decisions that affect women. This affects all women especially women of color. To charge \$20.00 is cutting out a lot of money. If we do not send these people, how can we send people to Ray Glass to learn about skills?

Mike Tadros yields to Corey: It is good to get so many opinions. I wish the current formal ammendment be passed. Mike: We can not discriminate against this organization. This is no luxury or a vacation. Join the organization if you want to go to D.C.

Laurie Horoshack: The Finance Committee sets up guidelines for clubs. The figure reached is 45% My constituents wish to see the 45% standard be upheld.

Jim Smith: Look at the GALA bill. They kicked in 300.00 of their own money. Eighteen (18) or Twenty (20) dollars is not an arbitrary number. I am not speaking for or against this bill.

Dean Wassenaar: Only because we have a surplus can this be done. This normally would be out of context. How to deal with the surplus is a question to consider. Will it go to traditional needs?

Rustin Morse: My hall refuses to fund this unless it is subsidized at 45%.

Randy Shea: Call to question.
Vote to pass Bill #26: 17Y, 11N, 2A.
The formal ammendment clearly passes.

Jim Smith: People from the Women's Center have shown an interest and I hope this passes.

EXECUTIVE REPORT

Dan Murphy: Next week at Finance meeting we will deal with the SA funding of trips. I would like to see this in writing.

I met with Governor Cuomo. We had a question and answer session for half an hour where there were about 300 students in the audience. There were 3 SA presidents. He was very harsh on Judy and SASU government. Last year he called SASU into his office and wanted a stance whether students wanted an increase in tuition or cuts in services. SASU would not take a stance. We talked about tuition and he is in favor of keeping tuition at this rate. We will need \$100 million to make up for the deficit. He was noncommittal on the parking fee. He made no assurance that parking fees would not be in his budget. He spoke a lot about his family and being a first generation Italian and being the first to get a college education. He talked about family issues such as AIDS, the homeless, and stopping drugs. He thought Bush and Dukakis would be good presidents together, where Bush could do the ceremonial aspect and Dukakis the financial aspects. He will re-think the parking issue. Trenice West: I saw many things in his perspective. Students should bring about a change. We spoke about the New Paltz incident. He was intriguing and interesting. We talked about drugs and the tuition hike. We learned about him and his issues. The meeting went well.

"Go SA" went well with congratulations to Paul, Randy and L.C.

On November 1, President Weber will be here. In December, members will be invited to Shady Shore.

Also in December Jo Meadows and Charlie Davis will be here to talk about the changes in the athletics budget.

Nicholas Cierro, a Freshman from Mackin, comprised the number of students there were in each ward. LOCO also put in a lot of time. We need to get students involved. Frats and Sororities may also be able to have an alderman. Two or three students could put the needs of students at the apex if we have two or three aldermen.

Ron Williams: The Jason Black prosecution asked to be put off until December. We are still waiting for reports. The lives and futures are in the hang.

Paul Austin: Did you get a Frisbee? "Go SA" was an overwhelming success. It did a lot to raise awareness and recruited a couple of new members of the clubs. There will be a Lead Center retreat for the presidents of all clubs and organizations coming up.

Emilio Dorcely: Annexation Committee came up with a few things. What type of responsibility do we have once the petitions have been sent in? Can we revoke it? I am meeting with the Mayor to

get a better view of the city. Nothing has been put down on paper.

We need to make a standard form for trips. Jim Smith gave a specific reason why he supported something. Senators next week take the time to come to these meetings.

Because of a last minute change in the way bills can be submitted S.A.V.E. will have something on Special Orders.

Dan Phillips: I am presently on the Environmental Committee. We have agreed to change from two cars to one. The \$15.00 registration fee and the \$5.00 housing fee will be taken care of by our members as well as all food for the weekend. 

MINUTES

The 15th meeting of the 25th Legislative Session was called to order at 6:05 p.m.

The roll was taken with the following senators absent: Laura Carroll (with proxy), Jennifer Greenwood (with proxy), Walliang Rosene, Angela Natoli (with proxy), and John Doherty.

The minutes were approved with no changes.

The agenda was approved with no changes.

EXECUTIVE REPORTS

Dan Murphy: Dr. Weber came and spoke to the Senate. This was his third or fourth chance to be invited to the Senate. He talked about his Five-Year Plan and his five major goals. So far he has had a very positive response. Various senators asked him questions pertaining to the Five Year Plan.

Does the Senate wish to support the plus/minus resolution? Will this be up to teacher discretion? Randy Shea: We must know more about this in order to give our opinion. Where should the spread go? Kevin Wallace: This is too ambiguous what are the limits? What are the benefits and the costs? Kathleen Rowse: People I spoke to don't agree that it is unnecessary/necessary. There is no true representation. Karyn Ventrilla: Lots of people really want this. Dr. Button: How is it that I will grade you, or how often will it change and how can you police this? Ken Kolton: We need more feed back because this is wishy-washy at best. Some professors are not consciencious about this. Please look at other schools and put this on paper.

At the Finance meeting with Jim Smith today, it looks as though it will take longer than expected to come up with some rules on clubs and taking trips. There was also a confusion as to where the finance meeting was to take place.

Tuesday, November 7, at 7 p.m. in Lanigan in Room 105, there will be a meeting to discuss the forks in the road problem. Captain McPherson, Diane Broadwell, Dean Wassenaar and Eli Rapport will be there.

Minimum wage will be raised to \$3.80 an hour and then within two years up to \$4.25. There is talk of a sub-minimum wage of people ages 16-19 where they could be paid \$3.23 for the first three months that they work. This has a great deal to do with us as students.

Emilio Dorcery: Mr. Maroney came and spoke on annexation. He said that it would be possible to create one ward because of reapportionment. We would then have one in nine aldermen. We would also have one in 36 in the county legislature possibly. Eighteen years ago we thought that this was a good idea and it still is.

There are no pay phones in the computer labs and as a matter of personal safety there should be one. The library pay phones should also be in working order.

The yellow buses are still working well although some people are still complaining. Some people would like to see a bus on Sunday, however this is very expensive. There will be three buses going around in the winter.

Monday, November 6 is black solidarity day. Anyone exposed to racism can be independent. All origins on campus are invited to join in the Union and to bring about a greater awareness. There will be an open microphone to speak.
