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PREAMBLE

WE, THE STUDENTS OF THE STATE UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK COLLEGE AT OSWEGO, IN RECOGNITION OF THE RESPONSIBILITY SHARED BY THE ADMINISTRATION, THE FACULTY, AND THE STUDENT BODY IN STUDENT LIFE AND AFFAIRS, HEREBY CONSTITUTE THE STATE UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK AT OSWEGO STUDENT ASSOCIATION, BELIEVING THAT BY ORGANIZING IN THIS WAY WE CAN BEST ACCOMPLISH THE FOLLOWING PURPOSES: TO SERVE AS AN APPELLATE AGENCY FOR PROBLEMS REFERRED TO THE STUDENT ASSOCIATION BY STUDENTS OR STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS: TO PROMOTE IN THE INTEREST OF THE COLLEGE COMMUNITY, A PROGRAM OF SERVICE, SOCIAL ACTIVITY, AND EDUCATIONAL PROJECTS.

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CONSTITUTION OF THE STUDENT ASSOCIATION  
OF THE  
STATE UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK COLLEGE AT OSWEGO  
(as of November 8, 1985)

Article I

Section I

All legislative power herein granted shall be vested in the Senate of the Student Association.

Section II

1. The Senate shall be composed of members chosen annually by the living -center or centers. (The term living center shall be defined in the By-Laws of this constitution.)
2. All Senators shall be regularly enrolled students of the State University of New York College at Oswego with an accumulative grade point index of at least the college minimum for good academic standing, and each shall at the end of his/her election be a member of that living center and shall remain a member of that living center for the duration of his/her office.
3. Senators shall be apportioned among the several living centers within the college according to the respective numbers in the living centers. The enumeration shall be made 30-60 days prior to the All Campus Election on the basis of estimated membership. The Senate shall determine the number of Senators to be chosen by each living center or group of living centers. The number of Senators shall never exceed 66 or be less than 33. No living center shall be denied representation.
4. When vacancies occur in the Senate by resignation or otherwise, they shall be immediately filled by Writs of Election issued by the Executive Authorities of the living center or centers, affected, and eventually filled by special election conducted among the residents of such living centers.
5. The Vice President of the Student Association shall be the President of the Senate, but shall have a vote only in the event of a tie.
6. The Senate shall choose its other officers, and also a President pro tempore, in the absence of the Vice President, or when he/she shall exercise the office of President of the Student Association.
7. The Senate shall have the sole power of impeachment and trial of impeachments. In all cases of impeachment the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court shall preside, except in the case of his own impeachment in which case the Vice President of the Student Association shall preside. No person shall be convicted without the occurrence of 2/3 of the members present.

8. Judgement on cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor or trust in the Student Association

### Section III

1. Senators may be elected at an open election of the members of their living center or living centers group.
2. The Senate shall assemble at least once every full academic week during the college year, except during the weeks of examinations and the first week of the fall semester.
3. All Senators shall be elected at the time of the All-Campus Elections.

### Section IV

1. The recourse to recall a Senator shall be in the hands of the constituencies from which the Senator is elected: to be conducted in the following manner:
  - a. Senators from Dormitories: 20% of the dorm populations must petition for Senator recall. This would require a referendum to be held, and, if 2/3 of those voting are in favor of a recall, the Senator will be removed from office.
  - b. Commuter Senators: 20% of the commuter population who voted in the last election must petition for Senator recall. This would require a referendum to be held, and if 2/3 of those voting are in favor of a recall, the Senator will be removed from office.
2. The Senate may determine the rules of its proceedings, discipline its members for disorderly behavior, and with the concurrence of 2/3 of the total Senate, expel a member.
3. The Senate shall keep a journal of its proceeding, and from time to time publish the same, and the yeas and nays of the Senate on any question shall, at the desire of 1/5 of those present, be entered in the journal.

### Section V

No Senator shall, during the time for which he or she was chosen hold any other civil office under the authority of the Student Association.

### Section VI

Every bill which shall have passed the Senate, before it becomes law, shall be presented to the President of the Student Association. If he approves it he shall sign it, but if he returns it with his objections to the Senate, they shall enter the objections in the journal and proceed to reconsider it. If after such reconsideration 2/3 of the total Senate agrees to pass the bill it shall become law. But in all cases the vote of the Senate shall be determined by yeas, nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill shall be entered in the journal. If any bill is not returned by the President within 10 regular class days after it has been presented to him, the same shall be law, in like manner as if he has signed it, unless the Senate by its adjournment prevents a return in the form of a vote, in which case it shall be law.

## Section VIII

The Senate shall be emposed:

1. To supervise the All-Campus Election.
2. To assess a Student Association tax (This tax shall be uniform throughout the Student Association.)
3. To determine the expenditures of the Student Association tax for the general welfare of the Student Association.
4. To have authority to make recommendations over all matters of policy affecting student welfare under this constitution.
5. To determine the line of succession to the Office of Student Association President following the Student Association Vice President.
6. To initiate and enact any legislation necessary to implement foregoing powers or to fulfill the purpose of this constitution as set forth in the preamble except where such jurisdiction shall be denied by the policies of the State University of New York or the State University of New York College at Oswego.

## Section VIII

1. No money shall be drawn from the treasury, but in consequence of appropriations made by law, and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all money shall be published from time to time.
2. The Senate shall pass no law regarding the internal operation of any student organization recognized under the authority of the office of the Dean of Students.

## Section IX

1. Upon presentation to the Senate of a Bill and a petition containing the signatures of 2/3 of the number of on campus students and 2/3 of the number of off campus students requesting a referendum, the Student Association Senate shall then determine the validity of the signatures within one week. When and if the required number of signatures are found valid, the Student Association Senate shall then conduct the requested referendum within 27 academic days. However the Senate shall not be obligated to conduct the referendum if the petitions are not validated 27 days before the last day of classes or if the said referendum does not comply with Student Association and SUNY guidelines. If the referendum is passed by the student body it shall have the same standing as a Bill passed by the Student Association President.
2. The Senate may, by 2/3 vote of the total membership, submit any bill to the Student Association who shall accept or reject it: and if accepted the said bill shall have the same standing as any bill passed by the Senate and signed by the Student Association President.

## Article II

### Section I

1. The executive power shall be vested in the Student Association President, who shall together with the Student Association Vice President, be elected by an All-Campus Election. The All-Campus Election shall be held at the earliest practical date during the period from the 15th of February to the 15th of March: and held office for a term of one year commencing the first day of April of the same year in which they were elected.
2. The President and Vice President shall be regularly enrolled students with an accumulative grade point index of at least two-tenths of a point(.2) above the college minimum for good academic standing, and shall not be eligible for graduation until the completion of the semester in which the term of office ends. The President at the beginning of the fall semester during his/her term of office shall be at least a first-semester junior with the minimum number of credits to be considered as such, and the Vice President shall be at least a second-semester sophomore.
3. In the event of inability of the President to discharge the powers and duties of his/her office, the same shall devolve on the Vice President.

### Section II

1. The Student Association President, before taking office shall take the following oath of office:

I do solemnly swear (of affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of President of the Student Association, and will to the best of my ability, preserve, protect, and defend the constitution of the Student Association of the State University College of New York at Oswego.

### Section III

The duties of the Student Association President shall include:

1. The presentation of a legislative program to the Senate at the first meeting following his/her election and at the beginning of each semester.
2. The appointment with the consent of the Senate, of all the officers whose appointment shall not be otherwise provided for.
3. The presentation of periodic messages upon the State of the Student Association to the Senate.
4. The execution of all legislation of the Senate for which he/she shall be responsible to the Senate, except where a specific executive department shall be given authority, in which case the appropriate executive head shall be responsible to the Senate.

#### Article IV

This constitution may be amended in the following manner: Upon the signing of a petition by 2/3 of the number of voters in the previous All-Campus Election, or by a 2/3 vote of all the members of the Senate, and amendment may be presented to the Student Association within two weeks after the presentation of the petition, in the case of such a presentation, to be accepted or rejected, and if accepted shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of this constitution.

#### Article V

1. All engagements with organizations or agencies outside of or within the college shall be as valid against the Student Association under this constitution, as under the Associated Student Body Council.
2. This constitution, and the laws of the Student Association which shall be made in pursuance thereof, and all the authority of the Student Association shall be the supreme law of student life at the State University of New York College at Oswego except where they may conflict with the policies or practices of the State University of New York of the State University College at Oswego.
3. The Senators before mentioned and all executive and judicial officers, of the Student Association shall be bound by oath or affirmation to support this constitution.

#### Article VI

The ratification of the constitution shall be determined by at least a quorum vote of the Associated Student Body Council.

#### Article VII

This constitution shall take effect immediately and shall be implemented by the present Associated Student Body Council.

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## Section IV

- The Student Association President shall be empowered to:
1. Require the opinion in writing of the principle officer of any executive department upon any subject relating to the department.
  2. Convene such special sessions of the Senate as he/she shall deem necessary.
  3. Recommend to the Senate such measures as he/she shall deem necessary.
  4. Enter into agreements with agencies and organizations outside the college community by and with the consent of the Senate and the proper college authorities.
  5. Represent the Student Association personally, and through his/her appointed representatives, in all its dealings with agencies and organizations outside the college community.
  6. Assume such other executive powers as shall not be denied by the policies of the State University of New York or the State University of New York College at Oswego, or by this constitution.

## Article III

### Section I

The judicial power shall be vested in a Supreme Court and such lower courts as the Senate shall establish. The number and manner of selection of justices of the Supreme and lower courts shall be determined by the Senate and the appointments of the Justices of the lower courts shall be for one year. Justices of the Supreme Court shall serve from the time of their appointment until they shall vacate their office by resignation or otherwise.

### Section II

The Senate shall establish such administrative offices as it shall deem necessary for the operation of the Supreme and lower courts and the Supreme Court shall appellate jurisdiction over any lower court created by the Senate.

### Section III

- The judicial power shall extend:
1. To all cases to which the Student Association shall be a party except as otherwise stated in the following parts of this section.
  2. To the student approval of all local student organization constitutions.
  3. To any case involving the constitutionality of an act or ruling of the Student Association.
  4. To any case involving the violation of an act of the Senate except as otherwise stated in the following part of this section.
  5. To any dispute between students, or between student organizations, if no lower court, housing unit court, executive committee shall have prior jurisdiction, in which case the trial or hearing was conducted properly with the power to demand such cases back to the original trial body.
  6. And to any other case where jurisdiction shall not be denied by the policies of the State University of New York College at Oswego.
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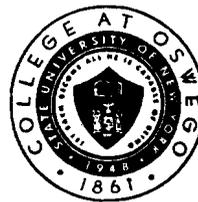
## BY-LAWS

1. A living center shall be defined for the purposes of Senate apportionment to one of three categories as follows: (a) on campus residence halls, (b) off campus residence units recognized as residence halls by the college, and (c) commuters (all students not residing in living centers categorized by a or b above). The Senate shall determine each year the grouping of the several living centers for the purpose of apportionment and enumeration of Senators to be elected by these groups of living centers. These By-Laws may be amended by a 2/3 vote of all the members of the Senate.
2. Permanent speaking seats shall be awarded to:
  - (a) A representative of the Office of the Dean of Students
  - (b) A representative of the Office of the Co-ordinator of Student Activities.
  - (c) The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.
  - (d) And to the delegated representative of any organization which the Senate shall designate by a majority vote.
3. The legislative session shall be one (1) year in length and shall begin on the first day in April and shall end on the last day of March of the following year.
4. All meetings of the Senate shall be conducted by Robert's Rules of Order.
5. Civil officials shall be:
  - (a) President and Vice President of the Student Association.
  - (b) Senators of the Student Association.
  - (c) Justices of the Supreme and lower Courts.
  - (d) Chairman and members of the various departments and the committees of the Student Association Executive and Judicial Branches.
6. A Senator or Justice at his/her own discretion may choose to participate in any of the various departments and committees of the Executive Branch of the Student Association for the purpose of aiding him in discharging the duties of his office.
7. These By-Laws may be amended by a 2/3 Vote of all the members in the Senate. All By-Laws to this constitution shall be subject to interpretation as bills under the provision of Article I, Section IX of this constitution.
8. This association is not organized for profit nor for the pecuniary gain of its members, officers or other private persons. It may not issue stock or declare or distribute dividends. No part of the income of the association shall endure to the benefit of any member, officer, or other person except it may pay a reasonable compensation for services rendered in effecting one or more of the association's purposes, and no member, officer, or other person shall be entitled to share in the distribution of any of the association assets on dissolution of the association. Any balance of money or assets remaining after the full payment of association obligations shall be directed exclusively to the furtherance of educational purposes.

9. Upon the dissolution of the association, the members, after payment of the just debts, obligations and liabilities of the association, will dispose of all its assets by transfer to such other not-for-profit organization(s) or organized and operated exclusively for educational purposes, or such other purposes as shall at that time qualify for exemption under Section 501-C(3) of the internal Revenue Code and Section 420 of the New York Real Property Tax Law as, in the judgment of the members, is best qualified and competent to promote the purposes of the association.
10. No part of the activities of the association shall be carrying on propoganda, or participating in, or intervening in (including the publication or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.
11. Whereas, the Senate, in accordance with the SA constitution, has the right to expel a member with the concurrence of two-thirds of its members:  
Grounds for removal from office of any senator shall be as follows:
  - A. Being absent from three consecutive Senate meetings without a proxy or a total of five senate meetings without a proxy.
  - B. Being absent from three consecutive committee meetings without a good excuse or five committee meetings without a good excuse.
  - C. Being absent from seven Senate meetings with or without a proxy.

These terms shall be considered binding on all Senators, Student or Faculty.

He felt that it was right not to come while campaigning for president. Did try to proxy. Now nobody is representing the dorm. The motion passed by a vote of 18y, 5n, 3a.

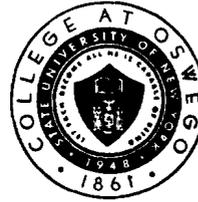
### PPB ADMINISTRATION

1. Telephone - Request was for #3700 and \$3000 recommended. An increase in this line was necessary. Money for reimbursements over the summer should be kept to a minimum. Organization agreed with the recommendation as long as the summer phone calls are reimbursed. Must make contacts over the summer. Bids for bands must be made immediately. Mark Tayler motioned for \$3000 and it passed.
2. Membership/subscriptions - Request was for \$569 and \$569 recommended. Andy Csont motioned for \$569 and it passed.
3. Office Supplies - Request was for \$300 and \$300 recommended. This amount is necessary for general office operations. Miguel motioned for \$300 and it passed.
4. Director's Salary - Request was for \$800 and \$800 recommended. This amount is adequate due to the amount of responsibility. Andy Csont motioned for \$800 and it passed.
5. Conferences - Request was for \$2255.50 and \$2001.90 recommended. This is enough to send 6 delegates to the NACA and 2 to ACUCA. Gain good ties for programming. Elimination of publicity delegate for NACA and eliminated NACA Spring Workshop. The organization said that the NACA Spring Workshop allows people on the board to make contacts with other local schools. Helps to know who the programming people are for contacts on stage rentals. Patti Tower motioned for \$2046.90 and it passed.

### EXPENSE ACCOUNT

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1. Truck rental - Request was for \$842 and \$842 recommended. Lynn Chadwick motioned for \$842 and it passed.

3. Supervisory fee- Request was for \$600 and \$320 recommended. This is 2 people X \$10 each X 4 shows. The organization said that the work entails working over a 24 hour period and it is strenuous. Worth more than \$40. It is dangerous and tiring. Beth Kucker motined for \$600. Mark Tayler called the question and \$600 passed by a vote of 17y, 5n, 2a.
4. Loaders - Request was for \$180 and \$96 recommended. This is for loading and unloading the equipment. Don Ammann motioned for \$72 or \$6/person and it passed.
5. Expected income - Request was for \$1542 and \$3000 recommended. Lou Taravella motioned for \$3000 and it passed.

1. Professional Services - Request was for \$22044 and \$20904 recommended. This is Friday film 22 X \$630 = \$13860

The organization said that film procees are increasing. This is no increase over last years allocation. We will not be able to get high quality films. Mark Tayler motioned for \$22044. Want to keep the high quality of the films. Pete Devine spoke against the motin. The quality has been good. Maybe just an increase in the Friday film allocation. Lou Taravella spoke against the motion and said to go with Budget Council's recommendation. Miguel Montes agreed with Mark and said that the quality of the films should stay the same. E. J. Cuneo said that they can work within \$20000. Don Ammann called the question and the motion failed by a vote of 8y, 14n. Dave McNally motioned for \$21344 changing the Friday films to \$650 each. ## PPB FINE ARTS

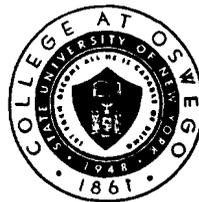

The agenda was approved with Resolution 18 on special orders, Resolution 19 on special orders, Bill 67 added to Old Business, Bill 68, 69, and 70 on special orders. Sue Castrigno was moved after Sue Wray under Executive Reports.

The minutes were approved with "Mark Walthour was appointed as a Supreme Court Justice" changed to "Mark Walthour was sworn in as a Supreme Court Justice by Barry Greenberg.

The agenda was changed with Bill 3 added to New Business, and Karen Mccarthy under the Finance Report.

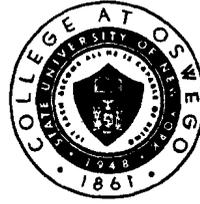
The minutes were approved as is.

- Good luck to all.

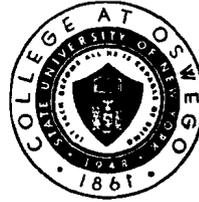

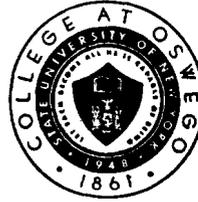

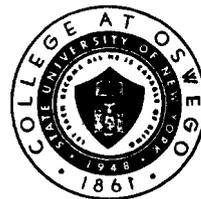
Bill 2 - tabled

Sue Muar opened nominations for president pro temp. Bill Quirk nominated Dave McNally, Linda Hoo nominated Scott Posner, Mark Hoogers nominated Julio Gracia, Andy Csont nominated Lynn Chadwick and Lynn Chadwick nominated Andy Csont. Sue Muar then motioned to close nominations. Dave McNally said that he has been a senator since Fall 1982 and this is this third administration. Served on Rules, Elections (chair), Student Services, Off Campus Committee, lobbied in Albany, have done alot of work in the Senate, voter registration and letter writing campaign. Scott Posner said that he was in the Senate his freshman and sophomore years. Served on Rules, Student Services, Board of Directors for Auxiliary Services sophomore and junior seat, lobbied in Albany, active with SASU. Became an RA in Onondaga and have since resigned. Now will devote time to SA again. Julio Gracia said that he has been in the Seate for two years. Ran for president of SA, know rules and philosophy for the Student Association. Lynn Chadwick said that this will be her first full term. Served on Student Services, Academic Policy Council. Andy Csont said that he has been a senator for a year, served on Elections, Student Services and know rules. Dave McNally won.

Bill 2 - Bob Ghosio said that this will help us decide as a whole what our priorities should be. It will give us unity. It will give us things to strive for. This will help us to try to strive for total success. Some are being worked on presently. We should not go off on tangents. Does not restrict us to just these things. Urge all to pass bill. Floating senate makes us accessable to the student body. Lynn Chadwick said that the floating senate will let people know what SA is. People must know how we work. Community must be dealt with as a whole. Public relations person can work closely with Off Campus Committ and the administration. The initiation of a women's safety task force is very vital to have more information on

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women's issues on this campus. Rules as a whole. Julie Schwartz asked why this bill was not a resolution. Bob Ghosio said that this is what we want to work on. We will try to be successful in these things. Lou Taravella said that it is not the senate's power to dictate priorities to the executive branch. Should not be a law. You are telling them how to run the office. Should not set down a list to set down own priorities. Bill Quirk said that the floating senate discriminates against off campus students. Julio Gracia said that the executives can be impeached if they don't do what we tell them to do. This is dangerous as a bill. Allison Zane said that this should not be law. Dangerous to do. Bob Ghosio reminded everybody that we are only voting on the bill rulistically. Jim Dingley said that he could not find anything about priorities in the SA constitution. Bill Quirk moved the question and it passed Rules but then the motion was rescinded. Karen McCarthy said that everyone can be impeached if you do not work on these issues. Dave McNally made a friendly amendment to add the word Senate after Student Association in the second whereas, to add the word Senate after Student Association in the third whereas, and in the be it enacted, to change the word executive to legislative branch. The amendments were accepted. Passed rules. Andy Csont motioned to put Bill 2 on the floor. Bob Ghosio said that the bill has been revised. Fits better to what we want to say. Not telling executive branch what to do. Bryan Ogden said that we want the executive branch to know that we feel strongly about these issues. Lynn Chadwick urged the passage of the bill. These priorities are a definite must on this campus. Eric Hoegler said that we need to discuss these ideas. People are not agains the ideas. They are against forcing it on somebody. Can look back in years to see what we have done. Andy Csont said that we were not trying to dictate policies to the executive branch. These are loose guidelines. Full support of the bill. Mike Regan asked of these priorities are what our constituents wanted. Michael Poole wanted to change the bill to a resolution and have the second priority removed. The floating senate is said to make our constituents aware. This is our job. Does the senate of the United States go to New York or California. We are elected to bring back information. The Hewitt Union is accessable. This should be a resolution stating our goals. If not done, the Senate can be impeached. The friendly amendment was not accepted. Lou Taravella said that many senators do not know what is going on. Meaning is a piece of trash. Don't tell executive branch how to run the office. This bill is watered down. Julio Gracia made a friendly amendment to change the bill to a resolution and it was accepted. Scott Posner said that good points have been brought up. More suitable as a resolution. 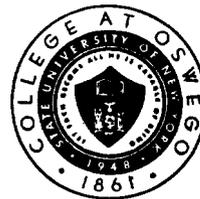
Since Bill 2 was changed to a resolution, every bill in the packet was changed to a number lower.

Bill 5 - There was a motion to waive rules and finance committees and it passed. Dave McNally made a motion to overrule the chair for putting this bill on special orders. It has not been researched. The motion to overrule the chair failed by a vote of 7y, 13n. Bob Ziegler said that in 1979-80 WTOP had a dictated leadership. Shipping damaged equipment that we now have Reason why equipment has not lasted the seven year norm. Mistake of WTOP and the SA finance director of 1979-80. Machine was fixed and afterwards began to chew up tapes. We need a new SONY 2800 and JVC. New machines have maintenance contract. Andy Csont said that WTOP has good quality programs. Loss of SA money for chewed up tapes. Scott Posner said that the machines are broke. Lynn Chadwick said that they need new machines. Knew about problem a while ago. Should have been brought up before this time. This has not been researched by anybody in finance. The organization said that they cannot rent another week. Michael Poole made a motion to table bill 6. \$3646.50 is a lot of money. Something should have been done before. Should not vote on this amount of money now. Bob Ghosio said that this should have been turned down on special orders. Michael Poole said that he was under the impression that the machine broke down yesterday. Tabling failed. Mike Regan said that he was in favor of passing the bill tonight. Safe to trust the organization. Need these things as soon as possible. Supported the bill. Mary Fish said that they need the funding. Here to benefit our constituents. Andy Csont motioned to accept bill 5 as it stands. Karen McCarthy said that we have already spent \$23,000 this year on new cameras. Trust the organization but maybe we should go to another vendor. Should be working on a compromise. Scott Posner said that it is unfortunate that we do not have a finance committee. The organization said that SA has the right to stop WTOP at any time. If we do not have a rented machine we will go off the air. Bill 5 failed by a vote of 7y, 12n, 3a. Scott Posner motioned to fund WTOP for machine rental for 5 days X \$78/day = \$390. In support of bill

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as a whole but we cannot make a decision at this point of time. Hope that a majority of the senators will make it a point to go down and check out WTOP. Julie Schwartz said that all senators should go down to WTOP to research this. Mike Regan supported giving WTOP money for rentals. The sum of \$390 passed by a vote of 2ly, 0n, 0a. There was a motion to rescind the action taken on Bill 5 and it passed by a vote of 2ly, 0n, 0a. Bill 5 will be tabled until next week.

Bill 7 - Karen McCarthy explained that the contingency account has been depleted because of the voting of two events. Below \$0 right now. This money will cover the Majestics for the ISA dinner, the contract with Centro, rental of VCR for WTOP and the election bill. Andy Csont made a motion to accept Bill 7 as it and it passed by a vote of 20y, 0n, 1a.

Resolution 1 - Jim Dingley said that the Academic Policy Committee rejected the resolution passed in the 19th Legislative Session. Our academic freedom is being stifled now. We are looking for 15 days to drop a course. Jim said that Albany has seven weeks, Binghamton eight weeks, Fredonia three and a half weeks, Buffalo seven and a half weeks, Stoney Brook eight weeks, Brockport seven and a half weeks and Cortland eleven weeks to drop a course. Night classes may only meet once with the drop period that we now have. This is not enough time. This will insure that students will have time. Resolution will be taken to academic policy board. Every senator should be there. John Sloan said that his constituents did not feel that 15 days was enough time to drop a course. Eric Hoegler said that we cannot be this off any longer. Julio Gracia said that many more students are on academic probation. Lynn Chadwick said that the Academic Policy Board has not done recent research. We must be real about what we want. Council has no general conclusion. Our constituents want an increase. Mike Regan spoke in favor of the resolution. It is a strong statement of the action that we want taken. John Sloan said that his constituents feel that if this passes, then they won't be able to get more time. End up with short end of the stick. Philip White said that we should take what we can get. Bob Ghosio said that you cannot drop a course if you only have 12 credits. Julie Schwartz said that this issue will be coming up on Monday in Faculty Assembly. Must be realistic. Faculty Assembly did not line twenty days. Add more things and we will be deflating ourselves. Dave McNally said that this is the sixth resolution going to Faculty Assembly since Fall 1981. We need to narrow our direction and get our foot in the door. Eric Hoegler said that teachers will get down to normal class capacity. Faculty Assembly does not listen or care. Need a vote of acclamation. Lynn Chadwick called the question and Dave McNally motioned for a vote of acclamation and it passed.

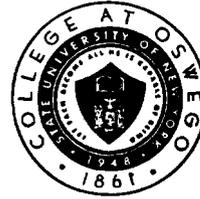

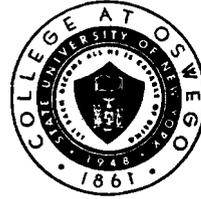

funds. Beverly Green is in charge of the funds at the Bursar's office. Students get bogged down with bills; they can apply for money. When checks from BEOG or TAP come in, the fund is repaid. It is not based on income. Can benefit students on campus by added to the fund. It is SA money. Not giving the State of New York \$10,000. E. J. Cuneo asked what happened if students need money and they have no collateral. Karen McCarthy said that there would be some recourse. Loans usually are given out if there is a guaranteed student loan. It will be called SA Emergency Loan Fund. There is no interest on loans. On paper, this is SA's money. Ultimately we will have control over it. We can call money back at end of fiscal year. Each loan between \$100-\$300. Cut down on people who have to be turned away. Lou Taravella said that there is a constant cycle of money. Dean Wassenaar said that some expenses can be deferred. Only way to cover it to get a loan against pending awards. Used to help carry people over. Sue Muar asked what the possibility of SA doing this themselves without control of Bursar's office way. Lou Taravella said that information of when checks come in would not be given to SA. Karen McCarthy said that they have a 99.9% collection rate. Sue Muar then asked how \$10,000 was arrived at. Karen McCarthy said that it was an arbitrary figure which was not too high. Sue Muar asked what Bursar's goes through if the loans are not paid back. Jim Wassenaar said that it is turned over to the attorney general's office. Sue Muar asked if there was a set time to pay the loan back. Karen McCarthy said no. Jay Button said that the Student Emergency Loan is desperately low. Students need this money. Encourage all to vote in favor. Students need this money. Encourage all to vote in favor of the bill. Linda Hoo made a friendly amendment to add a stipulation "at the end of the fiscal year, that a general report be given to see if there are any problems. Karen McCarthy said that it should be the responsibility of surplus committee. The amendment was not accepted. Linda Hoo then made a formal amendment to add a fifth whereas, "The Director of Finance, towards the end of each legislative session, come before the Senate to inform us of the status of the Student Emergency Loan Fund. Lou Taravella said that the surplus committee is find but not finance committee. They have nothing to do with this. Andy Csont called the question and the amendment passed by a vote of 24y, 2n, 3a. Michael Nemecek said that SA will have no control over the funds once they are handed out. Only about 100 people can use the money. Should we give the amount of money to only 100 students. Is it SA's job to help with financial burdens. We do this by fighting against room rent and tuition hikes. We already lend close to \$50,000 at the beginning of the year because of deferred bills. Bill must be made to get money back. There are a lot of ways to help out students on this campus. John Nemecek

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said that this constituents are against the bill. Bob Ghosio said that this will only benefit 100 students. We should do something to help all students. Narrows down to a special interest group. Dean Wassenaar said that there is a significant number of students on financial aid. All may need to benefit from Student Emergency Fund. Will be helpful at start of the semester. Would rather see reserve in fund rather than bank. Scott Posner said that he was not sure if the fund was being utilized correctly. We don't have enough control over this. Suggest someone from Bursar's come over to speak to us. Michael Poole said that the loans are given on a first come first served basis. Putting an additional \$10,000 will help so many more students. In favor of bill. Jim Taravella tabled Bill 2.

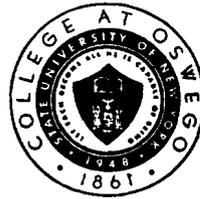
Michael Poole made a motion to grant Director of Finance a speaking seat in the Senate for the 20th Legislative Session. Jim Dingley said that it makes meetings run smoother. Sue Muar called the question and it passed.

Bob Ghosio made a motion to overrule the chair for tabling Bill 2. There was a vote of 16y, 6n and the ruling stood. Bill 2 was tabled.

Bill 4 - John Truran said that the unit-to-unit clamps secure the stage. Two years ago we needed about 20 more. Ten were never ordered and 10 are worn out. John Truran said that the profit from state rental will be used. Michael Poole went on to say that we are forced to pay. In favor of bill because we must pay or else we will be sued. E. J. Cuneo said that if there are no clamps, there will be no concert. Something must be done so that this does not happen again. Andy Csont said that we are setting a risky precedent. Was for the bill but he had some reservation. Eric Hoegler said that the income used for this purpose according to PPB's budget. John Truran said that he had to make a decision. Go out and get clamps or wait and put up state as it is. We should support John for what he did. Bill 4 passed by a vote of 25y, 0n, 0a.

Bill 5 - Passed Rules. Moved into Finance as a whole. Linda Hoo asked if there was a service account. Karen McCarthy said that there was not, but there was a warranty. Passed finance. The

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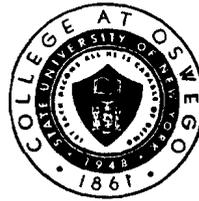

Andy Csont said that he was glad it was back as a bill. Not trying to dictate policy. There are open ideas and valid points. Michael Poole brought up Article 1 Section 8 of the constitution. Mike felt that we would be dictating policy if it passed as a bill. Bill is a law. Should be a resolution. It is our responsibility to continue on any resolution which comes up. Resolution if it says these are some of the things we will work on. Urged someone to change it to a resolution. Julie Schwartz agreed with Mike. Constituents are confused. We are getting away from what we are here for. Should be a resolution. Linda Hoo called the question and there was an objection. Sue Muar agreed with Mike. Should be a resolution. A bill is law. Resolution sets for the idea that is is something we want to do. If we don't do it. we are not held accountable for it. If the add/drop period is not extended, court case can be brought up. Rulistically it is defunct. If resolution, it should be by a vote of acclamation. E. J. Cuneo said that nobody wants to take the buck. 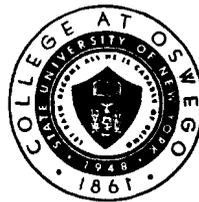

Bernie Henderson of the Bursar's office said that not a cent in the fund came from the state. Money was given by freinds or previous students. \$20,000 is used for loans to students. Linda Hoo asked what would happen if we wanted it back. Would it create a problem. Bernie said that it would. This is an admirable thing to do here. The fund becomes depleted about two times a semester. He then ran down the questions that the senators wrote down at the last meeting. Cannot graduate, receive grades, or get guaranteed loan check before they pay back the loan. Miguel Montes asked how many loans are made a year. Bernie said about 450. Andy Csont asked what percentage of students come back for a loan more than once. Bernie said about 10% use it more than once a semester. Lou Taravella said that it will help to benefit students rather than earn interest. Dean Wassenaar said that non traditional students are the most needy of this. There is an increasing number of them. Urged the passage of the bill. Mike Jones spoke strongly in favor of the bill. Bill Quirk called the question and the bill passed by a vote of 26y, 1n, 2a.

Resolution 2 - Jim Dingley said that he is working with RSVP and St. Paul's to set up a \$5,000 grant developed by the United Way. Students will earn credits and RSVP will be aiding as volunteers. It will have no specifi base - students will tutor on campus and RSVP in town. The money will be used for supplies (books, transportation, etc.) Working with Career Based Education to get students to receive credits (three hours). Jay Button asked how extensive the training was. Jim Dingley said that there is one weekend of trainging. Must put in about two hours per week to receive the credits. Phillip White asked if it was the same student with the same person all of

time. Jim Dingley said that it is flexible. Sandra Sheppard asked what the ration between students and person will be. Jim Dingley said one to one. Lynn Chadwick asked how many people will take advantage of this. Jim Dingley said that there was a list of over 400 people. Eric Hoegler said that it was a good way to help people who are not as fortunate as us and to better our community relations. Michael Poole spoke favorably to the resolution. Show community that we are interested in their well being. Bob Ghosio called the question and the resolution passed by a vote of acclamation.

Resolution 5 - Miguel Montes said that there have been three or four publicized rapes on campus. Last semester there was one in a dorm. We feel for the victims but we must take action and fight. By taking a stand we can enlighten more people. John Sloan said that the march will heighten awareness. Mike Jones said that there has been a series of Take Back the Night marches across the country. Means return the night as a safe time for women to walk in. Janine hoped that all came to march. John Nemecek called the question and the resolution passed by a vote of acclamation.

Bill 11 - John Sullivan, President of GSA said that he went to the dorm councils of Hart, Seneca, Funnelle, Onondaga, Scales and Riggs and they all voted in favor of the bill. There is a question of double representation. We are not asking for a voting seat. The Senate feels that we are asking too much. This is not true. A senator should vote the way his or her constituents want them to vote. By giving us a speaking seat, this will not change your voting power. E. J. Cuneo said that you should vote the way your constituents want you to vote and should leave biases at your dorm. Pete Devine said that Greeks are looking for a voice to express their views and for the senators to voice their views to the Greeks. Greek senators represent their constituents and not Greeks. Vote on the merits of the bill. Bill Quirk said that you should put personal prejudices aside. GSA represents 600 people or 10% of students. All they want is a speaking seat. Joe Duke said that the Greeks would like to help SA and keep communication lines open. This is a step to bridge us together. M. J. Rich thanked the senate for accepting the bill on special orders. GSA has never applied for funding from SA. The membership is restrictive. If not recognized by the college could not advertising on campus. According the Oswego's zoning laws, we are termed dormitories. A speaking seat is a step in the right direction. Julie Schwartz said that double representation is not true. We are a special interest group - 600 people who can work with SA and vise versa. One of our priorities is working with the community. We do

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service projects. The Dance Marathon was just about run by Greeks. Do not represent sorority or GSA but can give insight. She represents Seneca Hall. Maybe 75 people in the dorm are Greeks. Cannot speak out if the other 525 do not have same views. Bob Ziegler said that most news about Greeks is bad news. Don't hear about the good things. Can vote on a personal view. All constituents do not know what is going on. Give Greeks a bad reputation then you also give SA a bad reputation. We are students first and then Greeks. It is a unique issue. Allison Zane said that this will bring a better image to the town. We can offer suggestions. Barbara Horrigan said that a committee report would not give insight to Greeks. There is ignorance about what Greeks have gone through. Recognition agreement being signed unvoluntarily. Most Greeks have to abide by some sort of "dorm" policy. We should be rewarded a chance to tell of things going on. Some independents live in Greek houses and houses can be closed at any time. We are forced to follow rules we have no say in. We are a special interest group which stands to lose a lot without your help. Michael Poole said that we all have an image of what Greeks are about. A speaking seat will help all students on campus. We can get things done. Need GSA's manpower. Andy Csont said that the senate represents all people's opinions. Want to speak on an issue, have a senator yield to you. If a bill passes, others will want a speaking seat. Senators elected by you and we do the best job to represent you. Work through senators. Why can't speaking power come through senators? Other organizations still help out SA and they don't have a speaking seat. Hope the bill fails. Walter Bowler said that there is a problem. We have to admit that it is there. This is a step to healing the wound. This organization is unique. This is our chance to show unity. This is a change for accessibility. These students need help. Show something tangible. Speaking seat will be beneficial to all of us. Lou Taravella said that this is a unique situation. The organization has grown. There is such opposition to progress. This is a chance. Let's make it happen. Janine Frainier asked the senators how they can represent Greeks if the majority of students are independents. Don't alleviate them from us. We want to work with GSA. Scott Posner said that we want to work together. There can be a positive relationship. If they get a speaking seat, they will be getting something they already had. But they can decide if a speaking seat is better for them. We all want to work together. Being yielded to is not good enough for an important group. John Nemecek said that a committee report will be what you make it. Figures of dorm councils were close. This is a touchy issue. Will vote for the bill because his constituents want him to. Bob Ghosio said that GSA is 600 people with a special bond and unity. A strong unity and bonding with things is what SA wants to accomplish. We will get things done. Eric Hoegler said that we have not walked

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in with prejudices. Going by what we have heard. Communication can be done through a committee report. GSA asked for a lawyer. We listened and made a decision. If don't want a committee report, then GSA is being a spoiled brat. We can still communicate. The only difference between a speaking seat and being yielded to is a tap on the shoulder to a senator. Jay Button said that this issue is difficult. We come in with feelings based on experiences. What effect would passage of the bill have on the Senate? If nothing in constitution says we cannot offer a speaking seat, why not give it to them. Maybe it can help us. In support of the bill. Barry Greenberg said that GSA cannot be recognized by SA because they are Individ. org. not open to all students. Tammy Walker said that they can only be yielded to when there is a bill or resolution on the floor. We need a voice all the time. Committee report is not enough. 600 views must be expressed. We should all work together and should start by passing this bill. Linda Hoo commended GSA on lobbying efforts. It is important that if the bill does not pass, that other ways of opening communication lines be developed. Jim Wassenaar was not sure what the real motivation was for GSA coming to the senate for a speaking seat. Is is because of what Oswego is all about. Support the move if they support this body. Hope that in speaking, they listen. Must have two way communication. There is an opportunity for better communication. Urged the senate to pass the bill. Mark Tayler said that is a seat is granted, maybe we can express our anger ot happiness to what Greeks do. Sue Muar said that we have listened to a lot of people. There is a lot of enthusiasn. Greeks contribute a great amount of energy. We do want to open communication lines. Have a special interest. Organizations can ask us for a seat. Before long, many special interest groups will have speaking seats. When a group says they have something to say, we let them speak. You do have access to come and speak to us. GSA does not want a voting seat. Being able to speak is powerful and should be highly valued. Much control in how people vote. Cannot understand why GSA would want to help us allocate money. We are all working for a common cause - student cause. Can approach your senator if you are a Greek. Sue was very confused about the issue. Karen McCarthy said that some students feel the senate and SA is an elitist group. GSA is not recognized. Want to open communication and we can demonstrate it and give them a speaking seat. Working with a group is more effective than working through a group. We are not an elitist group. We should have an open mind on this issue. Jim Dingley said that GSA has a special interest which is our special interest. Executive branch fully supports GSA and hope that the bill passes. Lynn Chadwick said that at her dorm council there were 12 in favor of the bill. Every student has a voice in her dorm. They were not a majority. Has everybody

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knocked on doors. Three weeks ago her dorm council told her to vote in her own judgment. People at dorm council were a few of 450 who live in the dorm. If vote no, want all to think if she was not representing her constituents or being prejudice. If not representing constituents, want to be out of office. We are not a prejudice body. If you think that, you are sadly mistaken. Bill 11 passed by a vote of 2ly, 4n, 1a. Scott Posner said that now it is up to GSA. There is a lot of potential.

Resolution 7 - Lynn Chadwick said that in the budget every year, 25% is allocated to sports. Want to take money from SA and make most sports Division I and II. Give money to administration and we will have no control. What next? David Rothstein said that they might give financial aid on the basis of ability. Lynn Chadwick said that 21.9% would go back to the review board. Takes control out of SA's hands. You pay it, keep control over it. Bob Ghosia said that it is not right to impose such a mandatory fee. May neglect women's sports. Jim Wassenaar felt that the resolution should not come up this week. Premature to move on this tonight. E. J. Cuneo said that going Division I needs revenue. SUNY Board of Trustees can sacrifice student control of money for big bucks. Should pass by a vote of acclamation. Jim Dingley said that he was against what the committee recommended to the Board of Trustees. Bob Ziegler said that enrollment is gong down. Sports makes a lot of money. This is a direction that SUNY is taking to increase enrollment. Jim Wassenaar said that there is no interest in most of SUNY schools to go to Division I. Deserves a careful look. David McNally motioned to table the resolution and it passed.

John Sloan commended all of the Greeks who stayed for the rest of the meeting.

Oneida Hall raised the most money for the Dance Marathon.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:11.

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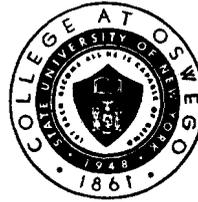

- Rules Committee felt that the Pathfinder seat should not be used at this time for it was not granted one in the 20th Legislative Session.

Lou Taravella, who was using the Pathfinder seat, said that Pathfinder was aware that he was using the seat even though he lives in Seneca. Pathfinder has no dorm council.

- Rules recommended that a speaking seat be granted and that the person live in Pathfinder who uses the seat.

Mark Tayler motioned to give Pathfinder a speaking seat with no stipulation as to where the person lives (Seneca or Pathfinder). Michael Poole said that Pathfinder has neglected their speaking seat in the past. There should be a stipulation. Julio Gracia said that as chairperson of Rules Committee, he will amek sure somebody comes and if not, will get rid of the seat. Andy Csont said that if Seneca and Pathfinder are comvined as a living center according to Student Association, then they already have three seats with senators. Dave McNally said that a speaking seat for Pathfinder should be used by a resident of Pathfinder. The seat is because of the living conditions they are under. Bill 10 - tabled.

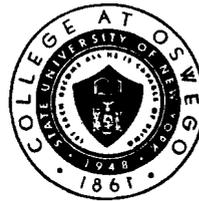

Bill 13 - Rules Committee recommended the funding the voter registration. Maybe SASU can pick up some of the funding. Finance Committee felt that the funding was necessary. Jim Dingley said that the t-shirts will be used so that people are easily recognized. Lynn Chadwick said that all of the supplies are needed for a successful drive. T-shirts give visibility. Julio Gracia said that voter registration is very important. Michael Poole said that the money is for a good cause. Jim Dingley said that SASU will be here to help us full force. Pete Devine said that there should be order so that things are kept to use every year. The bill passed by a vote of 20y, 0n, 0a.

Bill 14 - withdrawn

Bill 15 - Passed through Rules Committee as a whole. Passed through Finance Committee as a whole. Felt that the money should be given to the Dance Marathon to cover their debts. John Nemecek asked who would be liable to pay the debts if SA did not. The Dance Marathon Committee said that they did not know. Don Harrison explained that this was the 9th Dance Marathon. We decided to solicit organizations in Oswego County. This is the first year we have every had a deficit. Feel factors were weather, name of bands, \$3 for tickets both nights, much programming that weekend, fact that Delta Kappa Kappa was one of the beneficiaries, no major recipient, needed more publicity. Michael Poole said that if we don't pay, it may present legal problems. May never have another Dance Marathon again. Hope is passed. E. J. Cuneo said that they expected more people to show up. Urged the passage. Julie Schwartz said that students put input into it. We are also helping students, since they made it work. Jim Dingley said that Rosemary and Mike did an excellent job. Put in a whole semesters worth of work. Hurt if next year there was no marathon. Rosemary said that next year they want to promote it as "Dance Marathon Weekend".

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Sue Muar asked if there usually is a large participation from the community and the committee said that it is the largest attended campus activity. Dave McNally spoke in favor of the bill. He felt that it was sad that organizers were doing their best to keep morale up. Too bad that organizations and clubs that had events that weekend did not take a little time to think things out. Success cannot be measured economically. Jay Button asked if other places have been approached. The committee felt that they should approach the students first. Karen McCarthy said that if SA picks up the bill, it implies that we have confidence that this will not happen again. We should work so it does not happen again. Dance Marathon is unique. Only time it has ever faced deficit. Does Auxiliary Services also have a social responsibility here. Should bring Dance Marathon closer to SA. The bill passed by a vote of 17y, 0n, 3a.

Bill 16 - Eric Hoegler said that all of the layout for the SA Calendar will be done at the Oswegonian and printing costs will be picked up by Miller. Jay Button said that 7000 calendars for \$253.45, go for it. The bill passed by a vote of 17y, 1n, 0a.

Resolution 6 - Sue Muar said that the resolution was self-explanatory. John Nemecek said that there is a problem with a smoke-filled room. Lynn Chadwick said that it is everybody's right to breathe, just as it is everybody's right to smoke. The Resolution passed by a vote of 15y, 0n, 4a.

Resolution 7 - Dave Rothstein said that the task force consists of 5 students out of 28 people. The athletic fee cannot be taken out of financial aid or tap. Take control away from students saying we are irresponsible. Urged the Senate to pass the resolution. Lynn Chadwick said that we will lose 22% of our monies if this goes through. Board of Trustees wants Division 1 and 2 sports. This generates revenues. Must take a stand on this tonight. Go by vote of acclamation. Mike Poole asked if it was possible that we would not go Division 1 or 2 if passed. Jim Dingley said that it was. Mike then said that by passing this it would take control out of our hands. This is going away from quality of student life. We are here to get an education. Should pass by a vote of acclamation. Julie Schwartz said that if we have an athletic fee it will improve the quality of student life, enrollment will increase, good sports teams brings prestige to college, and it will tremendously help university centers. Are we ready to make a decision? Is there enough information? Terry Kenealy asked if we were giving the task force a change. We must look at what is in this for Oswego. Eric Hoegler said that the money and control is not the point of this. Big schools are pressurized and interferes with academics.

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Don't turn school into a sports arena. We have to better what we have first. Jay Button asked if we could do a better job of budgeting the money if there is an athletic fee and setting aside control. Andy Csont said that we will attract more quality athletes. Can't see how we could get on the competitive scale. State universities are here for academics and get a good, quality education. Support the resolution. Mike Mazzella said that he did not think Division 1 or 2 sports hurt academics. Women's sports could go Division 1 or 2. There is a lot to be looked at. Dean Wassenaar was not sure if the resolution reflected the truth. Permits individual units of state universities to go Division 1. This money will not go to grants and aids, it is only for funding the athletics. NCAA - many rules to assure equity. Issue is who will control disbursement of funds. Urged the Senate to pass the resolution. Sue Wray said that the fee could be detrimental. If majority of board are men, what will happen to women's sports. This resolution says we are satisfied with the way we are now. If some schools want to go Division 1, let them set up their own fund. Should give grants and aids for academic and not athletic ability. The resolution passed by a vote of 12y, 0n, 4a, 1p.

Resolution 8 - Janine Frainier said that Karen has worked very hard. Thanks for all she has done. John Nemecek said that he has learned a lot from Karen. Jim Dingley said that the Director of Finance has a thankless job. She has been an inspiration. Sue Wray said that Karen has been the most open minded Director of Finance that the Senate has ever had. Has diversified SA. Pete Devine said that Karen is motivated and dedicated. She is a professional. The resolution passed by a vote of acclamation.

Resolution 9 - Andy Csont said that John Elleman is a great guy. Served SA well in the last four years. He does not get paid and works hard. Dave McNally said that he first met John at several election hearings. He is an incredible human being. Filled Pete Tassini's shoes incredibly. Hard act to follow and it was done amazingly well. Resolution 9 passed by a vote of acclamation.

Resolution 10 - This one was for me, Jocelyn. I want to thank everybody for all that was said. This job has helped me in so many ways and I'll really miss it. Good luck to you all!

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## Notes

Following the completion and release of the Phase I Report, SUNY Central staff produced Position Papers I & II. Since that time, the focus has moved from the initial task force recommendation to the Staff Position Paper II.

The paper outlines four options:

1. Status Quo: Students will continue to administer and disburse student fees, following the review of athletic department - submitted budgets.
2. Tuition Increase: An increase in tuition which would incorporate an athletic fee to be administered by athletic departments.

Athletic Fee: This would establish a fee which would be disbursed directly to athletic departments.

The Board of Trustees has the power to implement any one of these options. It appears, however, they will decide on #2 and/or #4.

Suggestions were made, but legally, the Student Association cannot refrain our competitors from leasing their property to SUNY Oswego students.
- The Student Association is hoping to acquire a Computer System. No final decision was made.
- Renovation of Sheldon Hall.

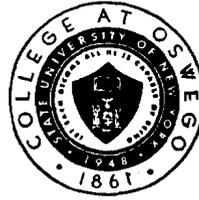
What are the benefits of restoring Sheldon Hall into a convention center for parents and students. State funding was unsuccessful for the restoration of Sheldon Hall. The Student Association felt that SUNY Oswego students were not informed as to the plans for rebuilding Sheldon Hall. Once more the Student Association was overlooked and many felt left out. Proposals as to how students can benefit from this were made and some of them included such as internships through the center, job openings to SUNY Oswego students and a learning experience -

Jim Dingley, President of Student Association called it "An administration vandalism".

Another problem was aroused concerning the parking space aligning Sheldon Hall. Part of that parking space might be reduced in the long run.

James Wassenaar, Dean of Students, also attended the meeting and answered questions from the Senate. He felt that students will benefit from the project and that we were informed well enough of the plans to rebuild the building.

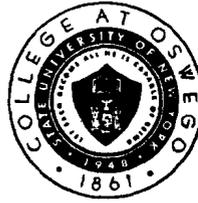
- All petitions must be received by the Student Association on Friday, September 21 by 3:00 p.m.

Bill 18 - The bill was passed by a vote of 2ly, 0n, 1a. Michael Poole picked up sponsorship of the bill. The Student Association felt that studetns should get more involved and interact with the Oswego community. It would be a "learning experience".

Bill 19 - The bill was passed by a vote of 13y, 2n, 6a. The Studetn Association will make an effort to get the number of student votes up this year. James Dingley pointed out that if studetns did not vote, how can one determine what they want. Throughout the discussion of the bill, difference of opinions was aroused as to the number of representatives SUNY Oswego should send to Albany. The Student Association felt that the greater the number of representatives, the better the response we would get. A total of \$1,442.00 funded by the Student Association, will be available for the trip to Albany to cover the expenses.

Bill 21 - The bill was passed by a vote of 14y, 0n, 4a. James Dingley stated that the fact the "Black Student Union Family was cut from their budget is detrimental. Out of 7,000 students 2 percent are minorities". Miguel Montes also stated that "Not funding this event would be an injustice".

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Resolution 12 - The resolution was passed by a vote of acclamation. Dave Rothstein and John Sloan picked up sponsorship of the resolution. James Dingley announced that if this resolution was passed, he would like to include the contents in a letter to the Board of Trustees in Albany.

Resolution 13 - The resolution was passed by a vote of 16y, 0n, 3a. Lin Chadwick picked up sponsorship of the resolution. James Dingley said that he would like to see students speak up and prove to the Alcohol Beverage Committee that they can change things around. Many agreed that SUNY Oswego students abused their past drinking privileges. However, Tammy Walker stated that "If we show them that we can follow rules, they'll give us another chance". Any effort to reverse the new alcohol policy must be activated before the October Deadline. There is very little time left to start working on this.

Resolution 15 - The resolution was passed by a vote of acclamation. This was a resolution in support of the fund-raising of the weight lifting team. They're trying to raise money to help the family of Frank Scurrdy with the medical bills and personal expenses.

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### MINUTES

The meeting was called to order at 6:02.

Roll call was taken and John Beerse, Kym Gero, Jeff Craner, Mary Fish, John Sloan, Ralph Aprea, Andy Csont, Eric Hoegler, Pete Hornick, Miguel Montes, and Thomas Nash were absent.

The agenda was approved with Resolution 14 withdrawn, Bills 24 and 25 on special order and resolution 16 on special orders.

The minutes were approved with bill 20 tabled and bill 22 was passed. Several changes in resolution 14 were made but later was withdrawn.

Student Association President, James Dingley discussed the renovation of Sheldon Hall again this week. Sheldon Hall, soon to be Sheldon Ontario Hotel and Conference Center. Joe Grant, Chairman of the Sheldon Hall Committee was present and answered questions concerning the project. In March, faculty members and the alumni worked on proposals to renovate Sheldon Hall. The final conclusion was that Best Western would handle the project. Final contracts have not yet been signed. Sheldon Hall will be reconstructed into a 130 room hotel and conference center including a cocktail lounge and restaurant. Mr. Grant stated that the parking space accompanying Sheldon Hall can only be used by the patrons of the hotel. Violators will be ticketed if parked in the hotel's parking space. Linda Hoo questioned Mr. Grant as to the reason why Sheldon Hall was closed. He replied that when the state visited the building, they found at least 57 safety violations ranging from that of heating to electrical problems. Lin Chadwick was concerned with the visual changes outside of Sheldon Hall. According to Mr. Grant, the artifacts in the building belongs to the college and any changes must be approved by the State of New York. "The facade will remain unchanged and the statue will remain college property" said Grant. A 60-year lease was

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signed with Best western. According to developer Frank Consentino the renovation of the building will bring approximately one hundred job opportunities. The sum payed to rent the building is \$10,000.00 per year. At the end of the 60 year period, SUNY Oswego will get back the renovated building at no cost. Mr. Grant confirmed that Sheldon Hall is still SUNY Oswego's property due to the fact that the final contracts have not yet been signed. He also stated that "the college will not benefit from this project; the \$10,000.00 will go to the State of New York. Property tax will go to the poeple of the town" The hotel will be a first rate hotel at approximately \$45.00 per night. As to the problem of vandalism, the city police would be notified and would be their responsibility since the hotel is not under the jurisdiction of the college.

## EXECUTIVE REPORTS

James Dingley - Voter's Registration - James Dingley was displeased with the outcome of Monday night. None of the senators showed up to help out in registering students for the elections. Dave McNally suggested that the Resident Assistant staff distribute voting applications for floor members. Janine Franier also suggested that floor charts be posted to check the ones who voted.

Alcohol policy - Monday night at 8:00 there will be a hearing in room 213 Hewitt Union. A letter of invitation to all resident assitants and dorm directors will be sent out. The discussion will include mainly the ways in which to change the Alcohol Policy. Abuse and Awareness, being a source of the alcohol problem on campus, can be a successful tool in making changes in the Alcohol Policy. Petitions against the current policy will be circulating throughout the dorms.

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Athletic Fee - Twenty five percent of the Student Association budget will go to the administration if the athletic fee is approved. On Tuesday, James Dingley will be going to Albany to meet with the SUNY Board of Trustees to discuss the fee. He will be needing 2 Senators to go with him. If any one is interested, please see James.

Bill 20 - tabled

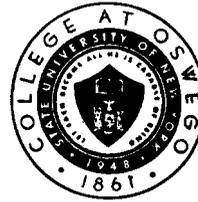
James Dingley requested that the bill be tabled because the people working on the bill were not present to discuss it.

Bill 22 - The bill was passed by a vote of 19y, 0n, 3a.

Dave Rothstein stated that an assistant would be working for 40 hours a week. Over the summer, President of Student Association, James Dingley needed an assistant and hired one. James stated that when he was in Albany attending meetings, he needed an assistant more than ever. Such responsibilities for the assistant included research on polling places and Student Association calendar. Another issue that was also discussed was that "it should be mandatory that the Vice-President remain in Oswego during the summer months" stated Janine Franier.

Resolution 14 - Withdrawn. James Dingley called "a radical resolution", with only 4 students voting seats in the Faculty Assembly. He also stated that Albany had 1/3 student representation and requested 1/2 student representation on this campus. At the moment, students have 4/66 seats representation on the Faculty Assembly. Julie Schwartz stated that the theory of 1/2 representation is great but not realistic and can cause problems. Dr. Button pointed out that the resolution was very ambiguous and needed a lot of clarifications. He also did not support the passing of the resolution, and agreed with Schwartz's statement that it is not realistic. "I would like to see an increase in student participation, but this request for 1/2 representation should be considered very carefully." said Button. Dean of students, James Wassenaar also supported Dr. Button's statement and said "if this is to extend student participation, I applaud; however if this is to gain power, I strongly question this matter".

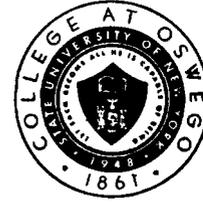

- The decision for the Hewitt Union Director is now pending President Radley's approval.

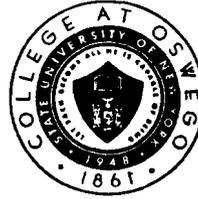
