39		 Senator Beck: How is the Direct Assembly?
40		President Randolph: Very poor. There were three large events going on in the Union and

47	President Randolph: Tried to be in contact with him however he has not received a reply.
48	 Senator Brazee: Is there an organization mailing list?
49	President Randolph: Yes, but we need better contact information.
50	 Senator Bacalles: There was a list created for this purpose last year.
51	President Randolph: They do not have the passwords to get into it.
52	• Senator Robinson: Where is your legislative agenda?
53	President Randolph: Does not have one yet. He will be bringing changes to the financial
54	policy, financial processes and expenditures, as well as the Constitution. Believes there
55	are some things in the financial policy that bind us, and tie our hands and we need to
56	remain flexible.
57	 Senator Beck: What did you mean by the Constitution?
58	President Randolph: Things are written a little too broad.
59	Senator Beck: We would like your input as soon as possible.
60	Senator Robinson: The Policy Committee has been open to all suggestions on the
61	Constitution.
62	 Senator Hershkowitz: It's a very important year, specifically with the referendum, what
63	do you have planned
64	President Randolph: I have a graphic designer working on advertising.
65	Senator Nichols: Have you looked up any prices for pens, mugs or key chains for the
66	referendum?
67	President Randolph: We do not have to start promoting it until February.
68	Senator Beck: I think it is important to start telling the organizations so they could plan
69	this before winter break, because I do not think we will have enough time to prepare
70	when we get back in the spring.
71	Senator Robinson: I agree.
72	Senator Brazee: I suggest that everyone's concerns about the referendum are correct. I
73	would like you to have a presentation and I would like to talk to you about some ideas I
74	have for it that I have thought about since this summer.
75 76	Senator Bacalles: We need to be proactive because if people see tuition increase and they
76	are asked, Do you want a mandatory SA fee? They will not want to vote yes for the fee.
77 70	President Randolph: Your concerns are noted. If you want me to I can make a
78 70	presentation for senate on my plans.
79	Senator Beck: In the computer lab at the Student Association Office the Internet is very
80 81	slow. President Randolph: He was in today looking at the computers, he claims it must be a
82	hardware problem and will send someone else over to fix it. He has made many calls
83	daily to get him to show up.
84	 Senator Bacalles: Where is Director Sutherland?
85	President Randolph: He is participating in a psychology experiment next door.
86	Senator Beck: Well it would be nice to know what our Directors are working on.
87	President Randolph: Your concerns are noted.
88	Gregory Lawson, Student Association Vice President: Miss A Meal is on Thursday. Make sure
89	you sign up. James Randi is tomorrow. He is happy with the Policy and Procedure
90	Committee; they are a good example of how the committees should run. There will be no
91	meeting next week.
92	Daniel Preston, Director of Disability Affairs: Miss A Meal is going on now please participate.
93	He finally got dates for the basketball team. They know how to play basketball so they
94	can't come crying to us when they lose. He is working on disabilities awareness week,
95	and would like to rename it. Disabled student group working on getting a student activist
96	group. Working with Justin from off campus affairs for handicap accessible. Brown Bag
97	Forum on disability needs. Are there any interested allies students oriented? He attended
98	a forum with Mr. Westfall: students with disabilities access to higher education at

Syracuse University and believes Syracuse University is going in the right direction. They have an internship in the education department where you can change the disability polices, for the better. The BCCC or Beyond Compliance Committee. He has a bowling story. Last week he went with a group to the new bowling alley. They are motivated and will fundraise to make money. The first meeting for the referendum is tomorrow. The budget is a maximum of \$3,000. Plans will be brought up about promoting. He wants to integrate the senators into his presentation at each hall council. In February if every senator could go to two SA organizations to present and talk personally to promote the referendum it would be great. There will be pamphlets mailed in February to promote the referendum and online voting. Last week Direct Assembly went well. There were 25 organizations and about 50 students. The next two direct assembly meetings will promote the referendum. The next meeting is Feb 5 in 104 Lanigan. He participated in airport interviews for the provost position. He is working on creating a group/organization bulletin. Has a rough draft of the Greek Council Constitution. There will be a set standards for membership, and has been well received so far. When asked about the Ontarian Mr. Randolph replied, "I want to run it less like a club and more like a business. The Layout crew would get paid by the hour so things will get done faster." Gregory Lawson, Student Association Vice President: Miss A Meal results are \$5, 429. This was the most successful program held on this campus. Good evening Senators, Guests of the senate, members of the audience and faculty. I come before you tonight to reflect on where we stand as an organization, what direction we are going in, and what I think that the student association as a whole should focus on in the future. I have put four and a half years of experience of being involved in the student association into my thoughts on how we are doing as a student government and reflected on many of our successes and failures over the years. Hopefully many of you will share the same sentiments as I do, and if you do not, then I hope that this can begin a dialogue in order to form a direction for us to travel in the future.

This year has gone very well so far, other than a number of critical incidents, that it would have been nearly impossible for us as a government to prevent, this year has not had anything significantly bad happen, and we have shown a great work ethic in implementing our government.

We are one of the most well organized student associations in the state, and we work very hard to cut down on the amount of red tape that we must go through in order to do business. I am very proud of how over the past few years we have progressively made ourselves more efficient, and are striving to work more with our constituencies, therefore increasing our accountability to them.

Our current Student Association budget features a diverse group of clubs and organizations, and I feel that for the most part, we are putting the students money in the right place, and contributing to the well rounded education that is a goal of this institution. Our regular operations are well defined and efficient, and we carry them out well. Most groups who work with us walk away happy, and we are very quick to accommodate unless there is something legitimate preventing us from doing so. When I look out to this room today, I see a room full of people who truly care about where we are going, and how good a job we are doing. This is what

keeps us doing a good job, and is an atmosphere that we must work very hard to maintain, I have been here in years where this was less prevalent, and when you look through our legislative books, it really shows. This year we are doing a very good job not just to maintain, but also to improve.

We are going into this referendum as a strong student association, but I have many fears about some of the directions we have traveled in because of past actions. We are in a precarious place, and I am not here to lay blame to why we are, but rather to reflect on it. What we do is not the problem; the problem is the common public perception of what goes on in the Student Association that is going to cause difficulties in this upcoming referendum. Because of this we must work very hard to win back the student body and convince them that we are worthy of their funding, and that what we do with their money makes a difference in their lives. I believe what that we need is to open more lines of communication with the students and show that although we do have public fights sometimes, we work together very well and efficiently and that we are providing a helpful and needed service to the student.

The Student Association would benefit a great amount if there were more visible community involvement by members of this government. I would like to see all of us step up and take a leadership role when it comes to community volunteer work and involvement, both on campus and in the local city community. Our office of community services is very successful and well run, but I feel that there is more that each one of us in this room today could do to bring more people into their doors to volunteer. In the coming year, on top of this, I can't emphasize enough, the leadership role that we can take in nurturing a sense of civic responsibility.

I cannot stress enough how important it is that we get our constituents out to vote in this falls presidential election. In budget committee this spring this will be kept in mind and I want all of you who plan to be here next year to really take it seriously. Our involvement in the political system on this

campus has been criticized a great deal in the past few years, and I for one think its time to turn this around.

I have worked very hard to strengthen the bonds we have with our organizations, and keep in close contact with them, and also made advances to reward the organizations that also wish to strengthen their ties with us. We are working towards increasing both the quality of the events we put on, while increasing the ensured safety and reaction time to critical incidents that may occur in the student association.

Another goal of this administration that has been well met is to not let any club flounder because of simple inexperience in the e-board or disheartening circumstances that hinder a clubs ability to operate. We have brought back groups that were struggling in the past few years, such as the Jewish student union, and given them the guidance needed to garner more attention, and increase their numbers by gaining both upper classmen and freshmen interest through programs like the opening weekend involvement fair. We have gone out

of our way to ensure that organizations such as the equestrian club are able to still practice and perform together. This fall we had to look high and low to find them insurance, and even harder to find them cheap insurance. A task put off by previous administrations. We have worked very hard to be up front and honest with groups, holding all to the same standard while asking and receiving mutual respect in return.

As we expand in size because of the number of clubs and organizations that receive funding from us. I believe it becomes even more important for us to be very strict in enforcing fiscal responsibility across the board. We must prevent redundancies from occurring in the budget, along with frivolous expenditures from taking place for the purpose of emptying an account. Other than refining how the budgeting process works, a key way of doing this can be through increasing the guidance that we provide to our clubs and organizations in how they allocate resources for events and activities.

We should take steps to go beyond what we normally do to encourage groups to work together. It is key that we consolidate our resources and efforts. Over the years we have begun to allow ourselves to spread out at a rate that is not realistically sustainable for much longer. Often one group will not know what another is doing, and two groups will wind up doing basically the same kind of event.

I would like to see us integrate faculty more into what we do. We are in a position to facilitate an expanded relationship between faculty and the student body. This would improve upon our academic environment on campus, benefiting all students who choose to participate. We as student leaders have a responsibility to reinforce an environment focused on learning. Through all our activities we sponsor, from sports to diversity events, we must always keep educating in mind, there is something to be learned from everything, and often there is a faculty person that could work with groups towards their

purpose while also enhancing their education, these faculty are just waiting to be tapped into.

We have done a tremendous amount of work in my tenure here as both president and as a senator, to increase our effectiveness as a student government. We run very smoothly and we clearly define what we must do.

I firmly believe that we need to shift our focus into new areas because we have defined how we operate so well, and defining it more at the rate we have, may not be the most beneficial thing that we can do for our student body. With the rest of my time in office, I am going to work on creating new programs for increasing social activities between student groups. Have events that cross boundaries and create a greater sense of community. I would like to see an environment at the direct assembly in the future where people are much more familiar with each other, where an introduction by group members is almost unnecessary, and everybody has a shared experience that links them together.

We could save tremendous amounts of money for groups and increase the worth of our community by encouraging a consolidation of resources and skills to facilitate larger events. We could have groups that have dances and balls together. Banquets in which groups get together and celebrate not only what they have done for the year, but what each other has done for the year, and all in the process, increasing the total quality of the event. These forms of interaction increase not only our sense of community, but expedite the exchange of ideas on campus while increasing the quality of the experiences of the participating students, which harbors a greater academic environment on campus that will encourage cooperation and action.

I do not suggest any radical changes in our government or how we operate, because our current model is a very good one. We have a real knack for tackling problems and fixing them quickly, and I would like to see us take that same ability and transfer it to the creation of programs that can encourage what I have suggested.

I would like to take this moment to say something to all of you that was said to me a few years ago, that changed my vision of the student association. We are all a valuable component of the student association. All of us have our own special abilities, ideas and attitudes. Each one of us is a cog in this machine and keeps it running on a daily basis. Despite this, it is important that we always keep our minds on the big picture, and where everything fits, and how important each one of our assigned tasks is, and what happens if this breaks down.

The same must be said about decision making in both my office, in the Supreme Court and in the senate. We must always focus on the campus wide affect of our actions, because it is often easy to lose focus of this, and get caught up in the moment. What is best for the students we represent is always the best course of action for the student association. Anything

that caters to something that isn't pure to this idea should not have a place in our operations and we must always work to keep ourselves in check.


